Hamilton and Cather Disolve Partnership

A dissolution of partnership in the Hamilton-Cather Clothing Company of this city, took place last week, James Cather having sold his interest to his partner, W. G. Hamilton. Mr. Hamilton also disposed of his holdings in the Company's store at Holyoke, Colorado, Mr. Cather having purchased the same.

The stock in the Holyoke store is now owned by Mr. Cather and Russell Amack. Mr. Cather expects to leave, within the near future for Holyoke, where he, with his family, will make their home, much to the regret of their many friends in Red Cloud.

Dies of Heart Failure

Domingo Arizaga, a Mexican, employed by the Burlington railroad in local construction work died suddenly in one of the bunk cars in the local yards last Thursday. Fellow workmen state that he had not been feeling well for a few days but gave the matter no serious thought. A local physician stated that death had been caused by heart failure.

The remains were brought to the Amack Mortuary and an inquest was held Friday. Owing to the citizenship of the deceased, and no relatives to look after the remains it was deemed advisable to hold the same here until communications had been established with the Mexican consul.

Hogs Bring Good Prices

The W. H. Taber pure bred hog sale held at the Besse sales pavilion in this city on last Thursday afternoon was well attended by local stockmen.

Out of town buyers, from as far east as Marion, Iowa were here and purchased some of the hogs. This in itself is strong evidence that Mr. Taber offered a choice lot of thoroughbreds.

Forty eight head were sold for a total of \$4357.50 or an average of \$89.12 per head.

The sow average was \$96.53 and the boars averaged \$226.09.

Garber Addresses Farmers

A regular meeting of the Red Cloud local of the Farmers Union was held at the L. O. O. F. hall Tuesday evening, which was well attended. The big feature of the evening was a "plain talk" by Daniel Garber, on the Non-Partisan League. His words of wisdom set the audience to thinking. He pointed out to them where the farmers of Nebraska were misled by the doctrine of the League, concerning their so-called affiliation with the Farmers Union as had been the farmers of North Dakota, warned them against letting the League get control of this state. Mr. Garber's idea of free speech was that every citizen of the nation was entitled to free speech, except when he proved to be a traitor. If the average citizen would mix as much common sense with their thoughts as does Mr. Garber it is a foregone conclusion that the farmers of this state will not accept any false doctrines.

This being the date fixed for the first statute meeting of the year, the County Board met at 11 a. m. with all members present. Meeting called to order by the County Clerk. On motion of Knigge, seconded by Waldo, W. H. Thomas was elected as Chairman of the County Board for the year 1920.

Chairman Thomas then appointed the following committees:

Committee To Check all other County Officers—Waldo and Thomas.

On motion the sum of \$100 was allowed the six papers of the county for publishing the Commissioners' proceedings for 1920. Same to be divided among the six papers.

County Treasurer's Semi Annual statements to be published by the Blade, Enterprise and Red Cloud Chief. Same to be published at one-half legal rates.

Delinquent Tax List to be published by the Guide Rock Signal and Commercial Advertiser. Same to be published at one-half legal rates.

Motion made and carried that Geo. H. Overing be appointed County Highway Commissioner for the year 1920 at a salary of \$1200 per year.

Board adjourned to 1 p. m.

Board reconvened at 1 p. m. with all members present.

Motion made and carried that the Budget of Expenses necessary for the office of County Agent for the year 1920 be approved as filed by Webster County Farm Bureau.

Motion made and carried that the County Highway Commissioner be allowed the sum of \$5 per month for office help.
