Two Souls Return to Maker

MRS. PORTER HALE
One of the saddest deaths which has occurred in this community was that of Mrs. Porter Hale, which occurred at the family home on Webster street on Saturday afternoon. Her passing from this life not only deprived a host of relatives of one of their dearly beloved, a husband of a devoted wife and two children of a kind and loving mother, but it also sacrificed the life of an infant.

About ten days ago she was stricken with the flu but was not in a serious condition until a few days previous to her death when she suffered a relapse and although every thing known to medical skill was resorted to, she continued to gradually weaken until at about 2:30 Saturday afternoon she passed to her eternal reward.

Ethel Emick was born near Amboy, September 30, 1887. Her entire life time was spent in this county, during which time she, by her kind and pleasant disposition, won for herself a large circle of friends. She was united in marriage with Porter Hale about fifteen years ago. Her husband, one daughter and one son, several brothers and sisters are left to mourn her untimely demise.

Funeral services were conducted from the late home on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30, Rev. I. B. Wagoner in charge. Interment was made in the city cemetery.

MRS. JOSEPH M. HEWITT
The death of Mrs. Joseph M. Hewitt, which occurred at the family home in this city, Tuesday, removed from our midst another of the pioneer citizens of Nebraska.

Anna M. Wildman was born in Me-haska County, Iowa, August 10, 1844. With the exception of a short period of time, during the civil war when she resided in Ohio, she lived in Iowa until her marriage to Joseph M. Hewitt, in February 1867. She, with her husband, came to Nebraska in the spring of 1872 and settled on a homestead, across the river from where Central City now stands. They continued to reside there until 1910, when they moved to Grand Island. In December 1916 they came to Red Cloud.

She was one of the pioneer citizens of Iowa as well as Nebraska and had experienced the hardships known only to our pioneers. She was one of the charter members of the LaCledde Baptist church, which is now known as the Polk Baptist church.

She is survived by her husband; three sons, E. P. of Omaha, I. M. of Scotts Bluff and W. C. of Minatare; two daughters, Mrs. Mary Hotchkiss of Colorado Springs and Mrs. W. D. Edson of this city. Four children preceded their mother to the Great Beyond.

A short funeral service will be held at the home Friday morning after which the remains will be taken to Central City for interment.

CALF CLUB

Last chance to become members of Webster County Calf Club. It is time for all boys and girls, who want to become members of this year's Calf Club, to send in their application blanks, as it is time for us to start buying the calves. 50 boys and girls have sent in applications.

Besides more prize money this year in the Calf Club, instruction will be given in Stock Judging, and the 3 best boys in Stock Judging will be taken to the State Fair to judge in a State Contest, all counties competing. The expenses of these three boys will be paid. It is almost as important to be able to judge an animal accurately as it is to raise one successfully. If a person does not know what constitutes good points in an animal, he is obliged to rely on some one else's judgment in both buying and selling. That is why we are training our boys and girls in Live Stock Judging.

Parents should encourage their boys to become a member of the Calf Club.

The following is a statement made by a soldier, ready to return to civil life. "I was raised on the farm but I am not going back. My father, while decent enough to me in a way, refuses to let me own anything. If I get a horse, he feels free to sell, trade or work it to suit himself. 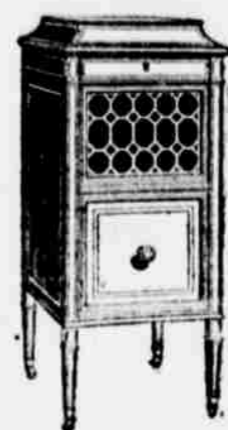
