Farm Bureau Notes

TREATING SEED POTATOES
Many inquiries are coming in, in regard to treating seed potatoes.

"Seed potatoes should be treated with a solution of 4 ounces of corrosive sublimate dissolved in a few gallons of hot water and diluted to 30 gallons. A good way is to put the potatoes loosely into sacks, then into a barrel and soak for one hour in the solution. Then spread them out and dry them before cutting.

"Four lots of potatoes may be treated in this way by extending the length of treatment 15 minutes for successive lot. This is to make up for the weakening of the solution. Treat the potatoes before the eyes have started very much. This is a better treatment which is commonly used. Corrosive sublimate is a poison and should be kept away from children and stock. None of the treated potatoes should be used for food."

If corrosive sublimate cannot be obtained, use formaldehyde, 1 pint to 30 gallons of water.

Pocket Gopher and Prairie Dog Poison—we have on hand, pocket gopher poison put up in sifter boxes, ready to put on the bait, and distribute in the run ways of the gopher. Also poison oats for prairie dogs. The cost of this prairie dog poison is small, running around 15c to 20c per acre.

Interesting Information Regarding Pool Halls

Why license them?—We would be pleased to learn ONE good reason for issuing license for the operating of pool halls.

We are glad to present to the voters of Red Cloud some of the reasons why they should cease to operate.

First—One of the present council, says, "they are the poor man's club. Please let us reason together and see if the theory be consistent. The operators of the three rooms in Red Cloud, pay better than two thousand dollars rent. They pay a revenue to the city in form of a tax on each table grading from twenty-five dollars down, and amounting to several hundred dollars; and said alderman is authority for the statement, that the "war tax" is several times as much more. Add to that, the necessary incidents, and the maintenance of the several families, and figure for your self, how they can possibly be a "poor man's club."

Second—A prominent citizen of Red Cloud who has employed boys and young men for years, states, that he has never known one to make good, who were frequenters of pool halls. He has reasoned with them to no avail and they, without exception returned to their old haunts. Think of that Mr. Citizen, and see if you think them necessary for the well being of your city.

Third—It has been said they were maintained for the pleasure of the farmers. Interview the average farmer, and you will learn that if pool hall support depended upon THEIR patronage, said pool halls would soon cease to operate for lack of patronage. A near Red Cloud farmer expresses the opinion that if the same rent were paid for the Potter room, (it being an ideal corner), and it were equipped for a rest room, that the vast majority of the farmers and their wives would appreciate it far more than all the pool and billiard halls that could operate. Again we earnestly request you to consider the matter.

Fourth—Our committee asked one of the aldermen why he voted to license pool halls. He replied by saying, well, as long as they are here, he might as well vote for them. At the same time he spoke of the petition being circulated to request the council to sanction Sunday base ball, and movies, and stated that as long as the evil (note the word evil) did not exist, the privilege would not be granted. By which argument we get the idea, that because an evil already exists, it must be tolerated. Watch for more from the same source in a later issue.

Fifth—Only one person interviewed has spoken favorably of their influence here, or in any city, which again proves that we find exceptions to all rules.

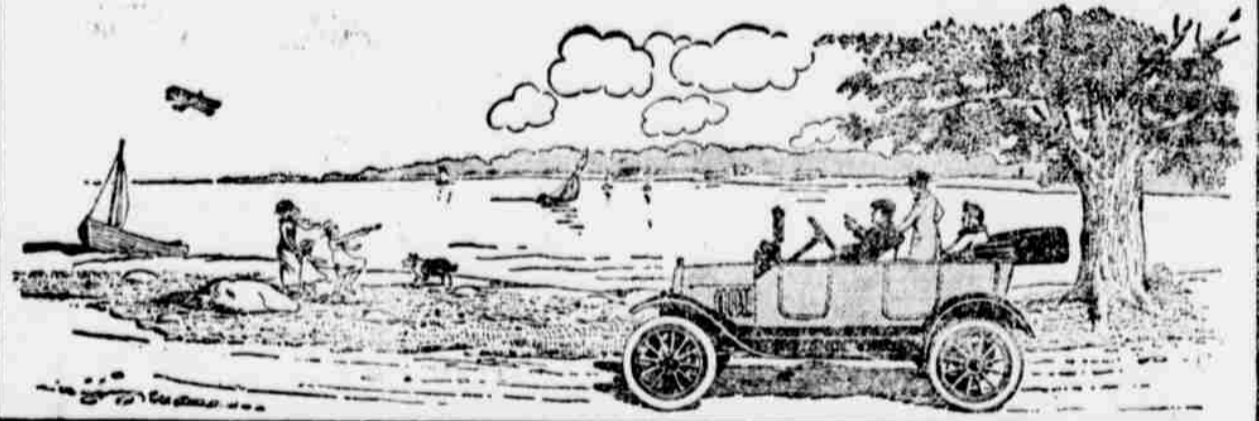
