Blackledge for District Judge

Upon the total result he was separated from the high man by only 172 votes and under the circumstances, especially that Adams county, where the heavy vote is, had two hom men who were well supported by the vote there, the result is a high commendation for Mr. Blackledge and demonstrates that he has the approval and support of the voters who know him and ought to be, as we believe he will be one of our next District Judges.

INITIAL CAMPAIGN SUPPER SCHEDULED FOR FRIDAY

Determined that their quota of the New World Movement will be subscribed in full and their church reported over the top on time, Red Cloud Baptists will meet for the initial campaign supper Friday evening of this week when team assignments will be made by J. M. Hewitt, local Campaign Director and final plans for the big campaign completed. The local church has been asked to contribute \$5,744 as its quota of the Nebraska apportionment of \$1,506,000 to the New World Movement fund of one hundred million dollars. Local Baptists met in an Hour of Prayer service at the church last Sunday afternoon and the spirit of serious enthusiasm which marked that service strongly indicated the splendid determination with which local Baptists are entering this campaign, the greatest church project they have ever attempted to shoulder.

At the supper Friday night all details for the actual canvass will be checked up and the teams will be ready to make their every-home visitation on Sunday, April 25. The financial campaign will be launched at the close of the services Sunday morning. The bulk of the local quota is expected to be obtained in subscriptions Sunday afternoon and the balance of the week will be devoted to cleaning up whatever deficit remains after the Sunday canvass. The Baptists here are hoping that they will be able to go over the top Sunday afternoon and report their church across the goal in the first day of the campaign.
