Farm Bureau Notes

WEBSTER COUNTY BREEDERS BUY SHORTHORNS

C. B. Steward, C. W. Johnston, J. W. Auld and D. B. Stunkard, attended the W. E. Prichard Dale Clarian Shorthorn Sale, at Walnut, Iowa

Johnston and Auld buy Secret Maid and Diamond's Red Rose; Two red cows with roan heifer calves at foot.

C. B. Steward buys cow, Leading Lady with Bull calf at foot.

D. B. Stunkard buys heifer, Spring Pale Mysie. Mr. Prichard's sale averaged \$1076.00 on 45 head.

The following day they attended Harry Hopley's sale, Atlantic, Iowa, and Johnston and Auld buy an Imported Cow, Lothain Blossom 2d, for \$2900.00. She is a white cow with a white Bull calf at foot; sired by Lothain Goldsmith.

The Hopley sale averaged \$1711.00 on 70 head.

SHEEP DEMONSTRATION

The Sheep demonstration at H. H. Crowell's was well attended by Webster County's Sheep Breeders, and two of Nuckols county's big breeders.

M. B. Posson, Extension Specialist in Animal Husbandry, from Lincoln was in charge of the demonstration.

He first demonstrated sheep shearing with clipper and shears. Then showing how to tag the wool before folding, and putting in a box to tie it. He explained the different grades of wool, and their relative value, so that after a farmer had sheared his sheep, he would know about what his wool would grade, and the price to expect for it. He next showed how to tell the age of sheep, and then demonstrated docking and castrating.

Some time was spent in talking wool sales for this year, and of organizing the sheep men. It was decided to perfect an organization of Sheep Breeders in the near future, and promote the sheep industry. Mr. Posson said that the sheep industry was the only industry that did not lose money the past year. Webster county has only 20 farmers, having a few sheep.

Mr. Crowell has the largest flock in the county. He has more than all the others put together.

Mr. Posson is a specialist in butchering, and promised that, when he held a butchering demonstration in the county this fall, he would also hold one for the Sheep Breeders and show them how to butcher, and cut up a sheep carcass.

The 30 sheep men and others interested in sheep, who attended the demonstration, took much interest in the demonstration, and their interest in the sheep industry, was shown by the questions that Mr. Posson has to answer.
