By unanimous action, the Board of Directors of the United States Chamber of Commerce, at the eighth annual meeting of the Chamber, held at Atlantic City, adopted a resolution endorsing the Americanization plan of the Salvation Army. This was done on April 29th and was without precedent, as the Chamber had never before endorsed a national organization. The resolution is the only one before "The American Ideals Committee," which was created at the convention. Among other things the endorsement says: "The Salvation Army is proceeding with a plan of Americanization that is in keeping with the program of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States to Americanize the millions of honest workers in our land, who are willing to become good citizens if they can only be shown how, with the same high ideals that The Salvation Army held out to the American troops in France."

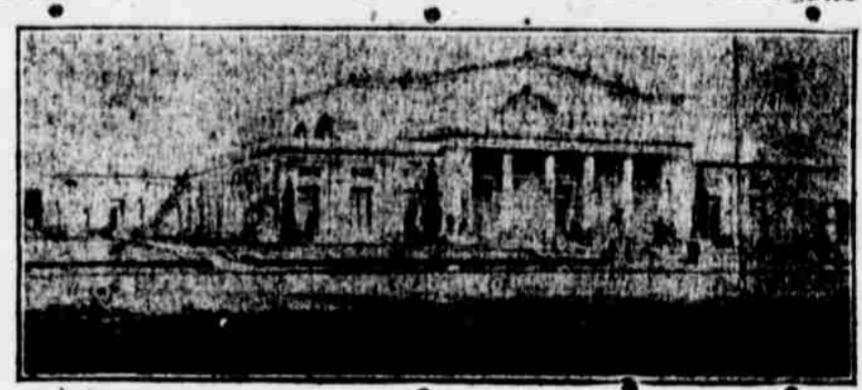
