After finishing her training she taught for a number of years at Cowles and then at Orleans. July 26, 1916, she was united in marriage to Rolland Milliken. Since that time her home has been on a farm near Orleans. When a young girl she united with the Methodist Episcopal church and at the time of her death was a members of that church at Orleans, Nebraska. Her life was always that of a faithful Christian, a faith that found expression in loving service to others. She never failed to do a friend a good turn. Dearly beloved by all who knew her she leaves to mourn her loss her husband and small son, besides her father, two brothers and a sister.
