#### AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS ON LIVE STOCK

By going over the Farm schedules taken by the Deputy Assessors, some interesting figures are found:  
Number of Hogs 1918-20, 886—1919-17, 996—1920-10, 410.

Number of Cattle 1918-25, 226—1919-24, 670—1920-14, 816.

Over half of the hogs in the county are in the south part of the county in five townships, as follows: Guide Rock, Garfield, Red Cloud, Inavale and Walnut Creek.

#### NUMBER OF SWINE THAT DIED

Some figures on the loss of swine in the various townships:

Harmony Township 1918—191 hogs died. 1920—458 hogs died.

Farmers in Harmony Township had considerable trouble of Cholera breaking out, the past year. They had not been in the habit of vaccinating. Twelve farmers vaccinated after Cholera broke out.

Potsdam Township—1918—382 hogs died. 1920—776 hogs died. This township had the largest loss in 1918, and also in 1920. Farmers in this township do not believe in vaccinating—only three vaccinated this last year.

Red Cloud and Guide Rock Townships are the swine producing townships of the county, almost one-fourth of the hogs in the county being in these two townships. The death loss in these two townships is very low, considering the number of hogs raised.

Guide Rock 1918—299 hogs died. 1920—88 hogs died. Red Cloud 1918—187 hogs died. 1920—163 hogs died. One third of the hogs vaccinated in the county are in these two townships.

The other three hog producing townships have a decrease in the death rate, because in these townships they vaccinate quite largely. Their death loss is as follows:

Inavale 1918—124. 1920—111. Walnut Creek 1918—165; 1920—105; Garfield 1918—342; 1920—146.

Ninety per cent of hog losses is due to Hog Cholera, according to the Bureau of Animal Industry—and from the above figures it would seem that it pays farmers to immunize their hogs against Hog Cholera.

#### Commissioners Proceedings

Red Cloud Nebr., June 21, 1920  
This being one of the statute meetings of the year the County Board of Commissioners met at 1 p. m. with all members present except Chairman Thomas.

Motion made and carried that Grant Shidler act as temporary chairman for this meeting.

At 2 o'clock the time set for hearing on the petition of W. R. Burwell to conduct a pool and billiard hall in the village of Inavale this matter was taken up and discussed by the Board. There being no remonstrances or objections filed against the granting of said license a motion was made by Waldo and seconded by Knigge that County Clerk be instructed to issue W. R. Burwell a new license for one year at the expiration of his present license after the payment to County Treasurer of the proper license fee. Motion carried.

A petition signed by the Trustees of Plainview cemetery in Glenwood precinct Webster County was filed with the Board asking for the enlargement of their cemetery by the addition of one acre of land on the south and west side of said cemetery. The land desired being owned by John Zoff. The County Clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Zoff of the filing of said petition.

The County Treasurer was instructed to reduce the personal assessment of J. J. Shipman by the amount of \$120 assessed value for the year 1919. Same being an erroneous assessment.

In the matter of Carl and Charles Novak, land owners in Batin precinct, who had paid their 1919 real estate tax under protest. The Board being unable to find any error in assessment the County Treasurer was instructed to issue them the regular tax receipt for the amount as shown on the tax books.

Application of Joseph B. Carr for admission to Soldiers' Home at Grand Island was approved by the Board.

Board adjourned to July 2, 1920.
