THE POLITICAL SITUATION IN IRELAND

Since my arrival in this country from Ireland, where I recently visited, many Irish as well as native Americans have asked me questions concerning Ireland in order to find out if the condition of affairs there was really as bad as represented by the newspapers.

Probably I cannot give you (my many friends) any further information than what you already know for two reasons; first, you have in this country, where freedom predominates, free speech and freedom of the public press. These (in a marked degree) are denied the people of Ireland, more so now than ever before. All news that has a tendency to darken, defame or taint the workings of the English government are curtailed, eliminated or entirely suppressed, whereas all the unscrupulous and concocted fabrications hatched by the enemies of Ireland, in order to cast a stigma on her name are published in full in the columns of the Unionist and Tory organs, so complete in all its parts that it is bound to attract attention and is easily read without the aid of glasses.

Well, my friends, as you are all anxious to hear of the welfare of the Emerald Isle I will do the best I can to give you at least a synopsis of the state of affairs as they exist there.

I spent several months in Ireland. My native place was County Donegal. I traveled around considerable and read Nationalist (Sinn Finn) and Unionist papers, had an interview with several prominent Sinn Finns. The condition of affairs throughout different parts of Ireland was bad during my stay there. Few counties being free from crime (murder) Donegal included. No fewer than 450 barracks or police stations were blown up, burned or partially destroyed. A large number of these barracks were vacated before their destruction. The destruction of these buildings, by a great mass of the people of Ireland does not come under the catalogue of crime, no more than in spring time here, to set fire to undesirable rubbish around the farm yard or home. Neither does it appear to be a crime in the eyes of the government, as the work is carried out in a systematic and legitimate manner, in no instances endangering life. The preliminary is to get the occupants out and provide suitable quarters for all of them near the danger zone. Then necessary documents are picked up before the conflagration.

I wish to mention and impress upon you what I have heard and read and what I believe is authentic; that neither the Sinn Finns nor the followers of John Redmond are connected, or in any way guilty of the murders or mis-deeds committed in Ireland.

Investigation, when pushed by the Sinn Finns have proven beyond doubt, that it is the enemies of Ireland—the hirelings of the English government—that were "caught with the goods on them."

The Sinn Finns have their own judges and prisoners and any one belonging to this organization who commits a crime is immediately brought to justice and punished by a fine or imprisonment.

Farm Bureau Notes

WEBSTER COUNTY IMPROVED LIVE STOCK BREEDERS' MEETING

The annual meeting of Webster county Improved Live Stock Breeders' will be held Saturday, August 7, at 2 p. m.—Men's Waiting Room (in the Court House).

This being the Annual Meeting, the election of officers for the ensuing year will be one of the main purposes of the meeting. Reports on the work the past year will be given and the work to be carried on the coming year will be outlined.

Some of the breeders are talking of organizing Breed Associations for their particular breed. This will be discussed at the meeting and if enough are in favor of this, separate organizations will be formed after the meeting. The purposes of a Breed Organization, such as the Poland China Breeders' Association would be, to hold Combination Sales, promote and boost the raising of more Poland Chinas.

CHAMPION HOG RAISER

Webster county's champion hog breeder, is Eddie Ohmsted, of Guroe Rock.

Last fall 38 grade Duroc Jersey Gilts were selected and bred to a pure bred male, purchased from Clarence Johnston. During the latter part of April and fore part of May, these gilts farrowed and raised 250 pigs. They were running on alfalfa pasture at the time of farrowing. When the pigs were about 2 months old they were given two dippings, about a week apart, then they were weaned. One week after weaning they were given worm capsules and castrated. Two weeks later they were vaccinated. This is the largest number of hogs, I have ever vaccinated for one man at one time, all of his own raising. These pigs will be turned in the corn field this fall and they will shuck their corn. The mothers of these pigs will be put on the market about September 1st, weighing around 375 to 400 lbs. each.

From the point of raising hogs for the market, the Ohmstedes have the best outlined, most successful and progressive means of handling their hogs of any one in the county.

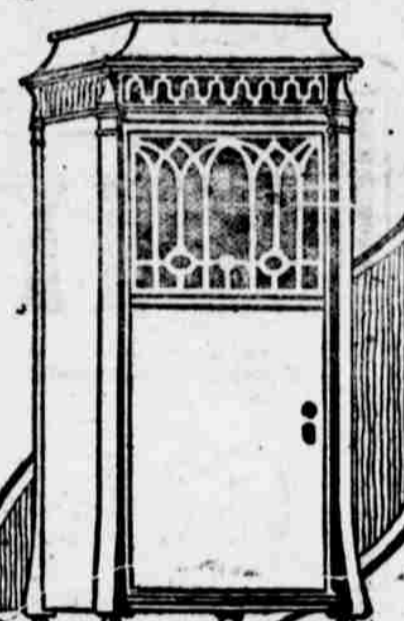
