REPORT THE MAN YOU MEET WHO HAS GLARING HEADLIGHTS TO THE NEAREST PEACE OFFICER

Sec. 31. Every motor vehicle while in use on public highways shall be provided with good and sufficient brakes and also with a suitable bell, horn or other signal and shall have exhibited during the period from one hour after sunset to one hour before sunrise one or more lamps showing white lights visible within a reasonable distance from the direction which such vehicle is proceeding, and a red light visible from the reverse direction; provided, further, it shall be unlawful to use on a vehicle of any kind operated on the public highways of this state any lighting device of over four candle power equipped with a reflector, unless the same shall be so designed, deflected or arranged that no portion of the beam of reflected light, when measured 75 feet from or more ahead of the lamps, shall rise above 42 inches from the level surface on which the vehicle stands under all conditions of the load. Spot lights shall not be used except when projecting their rays directly on the ground and at a distance not exceeding 30 feet in front of the vehicle. Sec. 32. The violation of any of the provisions of this act shall be deemed a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars for the first offense, and punishable by a fine of not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or imprisonment not exceeding sixty days in the county jail for each subsequent offense, or both fine and imprisonment provided, however, if any person operating a motor vehicle in violation of this act shall by so doing seriously maim or disfigure any person, or cause the death of any person or persons, he shall upon conviction thereof be fined not less than two hundred dollars nor more than five hundred dollars, or be imprisoned in the penitentiary for not less than one year or more than ten years. Officers in every section of the state have been called upon to rigidly enforce the above law and this community will prove no exception. N. P. PHILLIPS, City Marshall.
