C. M. SHERWOOD ELECTED MEMBER STATE COMMITTEE

The second annual state convention of the American Legion was held at Hastings, Thursday, Friday and Saturday of last week. There were over 500 delegates from the different posts throughout the state present.

The convention was called to order by State Commander, Earl M. Cline of Nebraska City after which the invocation was given by Chaplain H. C. Capsey. Then Mayor Stiner, of Hastings, delivered the address of welcome.

Allan A. Turkey of Omaha, National Vice Commander was present and delivered an address which was received with enthusiasm. After the different committees were appointed the convention adjourned for the day to attend the ball game, dances and picture shows in the evening.

Friday morning National Commander D'Olier was present and given a great ovation from the beginning to the close of his address, in which he brought forth the facts that the American Legion is the only organization known in which all the elements in the country are represented; that everyone must realize that the ex-service men will run this country; run it not because they are service men but because they were physically, morally and mentally fit. Its object is to keep alive the spirit of service that animated the army, navy and marines; to give to citizenship the same unselfish service.

A representative of the War Risk Insurance was present and fully explained the terms of the insurance to his audience.

In the afternoon Gov. McKelvie and Mrs. Dietrich addressed the convention after which the state executive committee and delegates were elected to attend the National Convention at Cleveland, Ohio, next month. C. M. Sherwood of this city and Dr. Crissman of Hastings were elected members of the State Executive Committee from the fifth district. It was also decided to hold the State Convention at Fremont, next year.

In the evening an athletic carnival was held at which time Joe and Anton Stecker put on an exhibition wrestling match, and also another was given by two light weights. This was followed by the famous base ball story of W. W. Hughes of David City. There was an abundance of music furnished by the 20th Infantry band of Ft. Crook and the Hastings band.

Saturday morning the different committees made their reports. H. S. Foe of this city served on the constitutional and by-law amendment committee.

Following this resolutions were passed recommending compulsory military training. The convention also endorsed the bonus legislation now before congress, also that more government land be made available for the returned soldiers. It also favored the boxing bill, the same to be patterned after the recommendation of the army and navy boxing commission. This would permit ten round boxing bouts under state regulation. Another of its resolutions favored more drastic legislation for dealing with draft evaders.

Election of officers was then held and Robert Simmons, of Scottsbluff, was elected state commander after which the other state officers were elected.

Ed McDermott on behalf of the delegates presented Past Commander Earl Cline, with a handsome gold watch in honor of the excellent and untiring service that he had rendered the past year.
