FETTY MAN SOLD

ECKHARDT SEDAN
 Chicago, Sept. 13—Homer D. Fetty, who came here recently from Hastings, Neb., was to be questioned today on details of his alleged confession of the theft of \$20,000 in jewelry to put his bid, Mrs. Norma Donta Prince-Dickey-Steele-Langley-Fetty, 40 years old, "on her feet."

Mrs. Fetty was also to be questioned on her arrival here today from Fort Wayne, Ind., where her fourth honeymoon was broken off.

Sheriff Cole this morning notified from the Liverpool London Globe Insurance Company a telegram saying that Homer D. Fetty, arrested in Chicago, is the man who sold a stolen sedan to H. O. Eckhardt of Hastings for \$2,000 last July. The car was seized by Sheriff Cole within the last few days and was turned over to the insurance company for whom it is stored in a Hastings garage.

Frank L. Swanson, representing the insurance company came to Hastings a few days ago, to look after the car upon which he said his company had paid \$3,000 theft insurance to the owner, William Benner, 6032 Winthrop avenue, Chicago, who was the original purchaser.

Swanson said that Fetty's home is in Inavale, Neb. Fetty registered in July at the E. A. Brandes garage, and Swanson after comparing the handwriting upon the register and upon the bill of sale which showed the purchase of the car by Fetty from the Wilson Avenue Motor Sales Company of Chicago, declared that the same hand had written both.

When Fetty sold the car to Eckhardt, his explanation was that he was a traveling salesman, and that when he purchased the sedan it was because that type of car suited his business at that time. Afterwards, he said, he got into another line, and for this line the sedan was not suitable, and he wanted to sell it to get another type of car. This was the reason given for disposing of the sedan.

The car is a new super-six Hudson and it was purchased by Eckhardt for \$2,000, which is the amount of his loss in the transaction. When Fetty was here he was accompanied by a woman.

Ever since the car was sold the sheriff's office has been investigating Fetty, and through the Illinois sales department of the maker of the car learned that it had been stolen from Benner. Upon the information given by the sheriff's office the insurance company sent a representative here.

Unconfirmed rumors have reached the office of the insurance company here that before he sold the car to Eckhardt, Fetty had sold it three times, stealing it back each time.

Because of these rumors a strict watch was kept over the car to keep it from being again taken.

Inquiry in Chicago by the insurance company, as reported to Sheriff Cole, failed to reveal the Wilson Avenue Motor Sales Company, and the sheriff concluded that the bill of sale naming that firm as the seller of the car to Fetty was a forgery.—Hastings Tribune.

NATION HAS BIG CORN CROP

The marketing bulletin issued by the University of Nebraska College of Agriculture contains the following comment on the corn crop. The estimated acreage for 1920 is 103,648,000 acres, which is a little below the ten year average. The estimated production is 3,003,322,000 bushels, which is nearly 10 per cent above the five-year average of 1914-1918. Unless we have an exceptionally early frost the 1920 corn crop will be the second largest ever produced, being exceeded only by the crop of 1917. The excess production in 1917 was used to produce pork. What will be done with the 1920 surplus?
