### WEBSTER COUNTY STOCK JUDGING TEAM

Nebraska's Champion Junior Stock Judging Team, which hails from Webster county and composed of Alfred Fringer, Lawrence Means, and Lyle Ashby, will leave Saturday morning, October 16, for Atlanta, Georgia, to compete with twenty State Champion Teams, at the International Judging Contest, October 19 to 22.

\$1200.00 in prize money is offered besides seven free trips to the English Royal Show, held at London, England.

While at Atlanta, the boys will be cared for at the International Club camp, and entertained by the Rotary Club of Atlanta.

The route in going to Atlanta is as follows: Red Cloud to St. Joseph, Kansas City, St. Louis, Evansville, Nashville, and Chattanooga, to Atlanta, and coming back by way of Atlanta to Birmingham, Memphis, Springfield and Kansas City to Red Cloud. This trip will take the boys through Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee, North Carolina, Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Arkansas.
