A birthday surprise party was given Friday evening in honor of Miss Gem White and John Coon at the home of the latter's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Coon. Those present were a number of the Red Cloud faculty, the Juniors and several other friends. There were about fifty in all. Light refreshments were served by the Mesdames White and Coon. At a late hour all departed for their homes having spent a very enjoyable evening.

Local physicians report several cases of typhoid fever in the city, and while there is no cause for alarm they request that the matter be given publicity and that everyone take immediate steps to prevent further cases. Samples of water from private wells have been analyzed and it is found that it contained germs. A test will also be made of the water from the city wells. Contagion from this source may be prevented if the water is boiled before using. The homes, cellars, outbuildings, etc., should be thoroughly disinfected and cleaned. Make war on the fly as he is a carrier of germs. If everyone will do their part there is no cause for alarm.

### Bound Over to District Court

As a result of an illegal egg deal, Lee Fredericks and Clayton Woods are now in the county jail awaiting the decision of the law. It appears that these two young men appropriated eggs belonging to Jacob Peterson and the Farmers Union of this city, and took them across the line into Lebanon, Kansas, where they sold six of the cases at the Ryan place of business in that city. Mr. Ryan learned that a pair of eggs consigned to a party at Wymore checked 32 cases short, got busy and secured the necessary legal papers to detain the men. Sunday morning Sheriff Huffer located seven full cases and six empty ones hidden under a culvert near the Thomas place west of Red Cloud. The pair of egg merchants were brought to Red Cloud and given a preliminary hearing Tuesday afternoon and held over for the next term of court, in custody of Sheriff Huffer, being unable to furnish bonds of \$1000. They maintain that they are innocent. Nevertheless the outlook for them is not very cheerful.

### J. L. Christian

John L. Christian, for a number of years a resident on this city, answered the final summons last Sunday, October 24th, after a brief illness. Although complaining occasionally of ill health, Mr. Christian was able to be about and look after his business and no serious thought was given the matter until a short time previous to his demise. He leaves to mourn his departure, his wife, one son, Floyd, four daughters, Mrs. Eva Tate, Misses Hattie, Minnie and Mary, one brother, two sisters and several grand children, nieces and nephews. The family accompanied the remains to Tarkio, Mo. Tuesday, where funeral services were held and interment made in the cemetery at that place.
