STOCK JUDGING TEAM

Webster County's Stock Judging team composed of Alfred Fringer, Lawrence Means, and Lyle Ashby, fought their last battle October 19 to 23, at the International Club Judging Contest, held at Atlanta, Georgia. They met defeat, Texas winning the big prize, a free trip to the English Royal held at London, England. The Southeastern Fair Association, gives \$7000.00 to the winning team. Texas had spent \$3000.00 and several months at the leading stock shows training their team. The bankers of Texas put up the financial backing to train the team.

The Nebraska team won its share of the cash premiums, put up by the breed associations. Twelve breeds of live stock were judged, as follows: Angus, Hereford, Shorthorns, Jersey, Holstein and Gurnsey cattle; Hampshire, Duroc, Poland China and Berkshire hogs; Shropshire and Southdown sheep. There were 4 animals in each class. 50 points was score on placing and 50 points on oral reasons. Texas had Nebraska bested on oral reasons. Nebraska won 1st on Angus cattle, 1st on Poland China hogs, 1st on Shropshire sheep, 3rd on Holstein, 6th on Shorthorns. Lawrence Means of Red Cloud, ranked 2nd, score 97, on Shorthorns, and 4th on Hampshires, score 92. Alfred Fringer of Guide Rock, ranked 2nd, score 89, on Angus cattle, 3rd on Herefords, score 96, and 3rd on Poland Chinas, score 96. Lyle Ashby, Guide Rock, was 4th in Angus cattle, score 82.

The trip to Atlanta, Georgia, was a great trip. Many interesting things were seen. It is hoped that Webster county will come out next year with a strong team and not only win at Nebraska and Sioux City, but will be strong enough to clean up the South.

VETERINARIANS' MEETING

A district meeting of the Veterinarians in the south part of the state, was held in Red Cloud on Tuesday, November 9th. 30 veterinarians were present. Dr. Sprague of Lincoln was in charge of the demonstrations. 15 head of re-actors were secured from Mr. Steward's Bang herd, and demonstrations were made, demonstrating the three methods of testing for Tuberculosis. State Veterinarian, Dr. W. F. Spencer was present for the evening meeting and while here secured Mr. Chas. Steward as one of the principal speakers at a State meeting of Veterinarians to be held December 15, at Grand Island. Dr. Beyers, of Osceola, Dr. Giffie, of Geneva, Dr. Lea, of Hastings, all being connected with the Bureau of Animal Industry, were also present.

Webster county is one of the leading counties in the state for accredited herds under Federal supervision for Tuberculosis eradication. All the Purebred breeders of the county except 3 or 4 are having their herds accredited. The latest additions to the list are: Frank Bean, Red Cloud, Alf Nolan, Red Cloud, Carl Rudd, Inavale, and C. H. Miner, Red Cloud.

Dr. Spencer reported that since January 1st, 1920, 47,560 head of cattle had been tested under the cooperative test and 2,011 re-actors found.

WHY AN EX-SERVICE MAN SHOULD JOIN AMERICAN LEGION

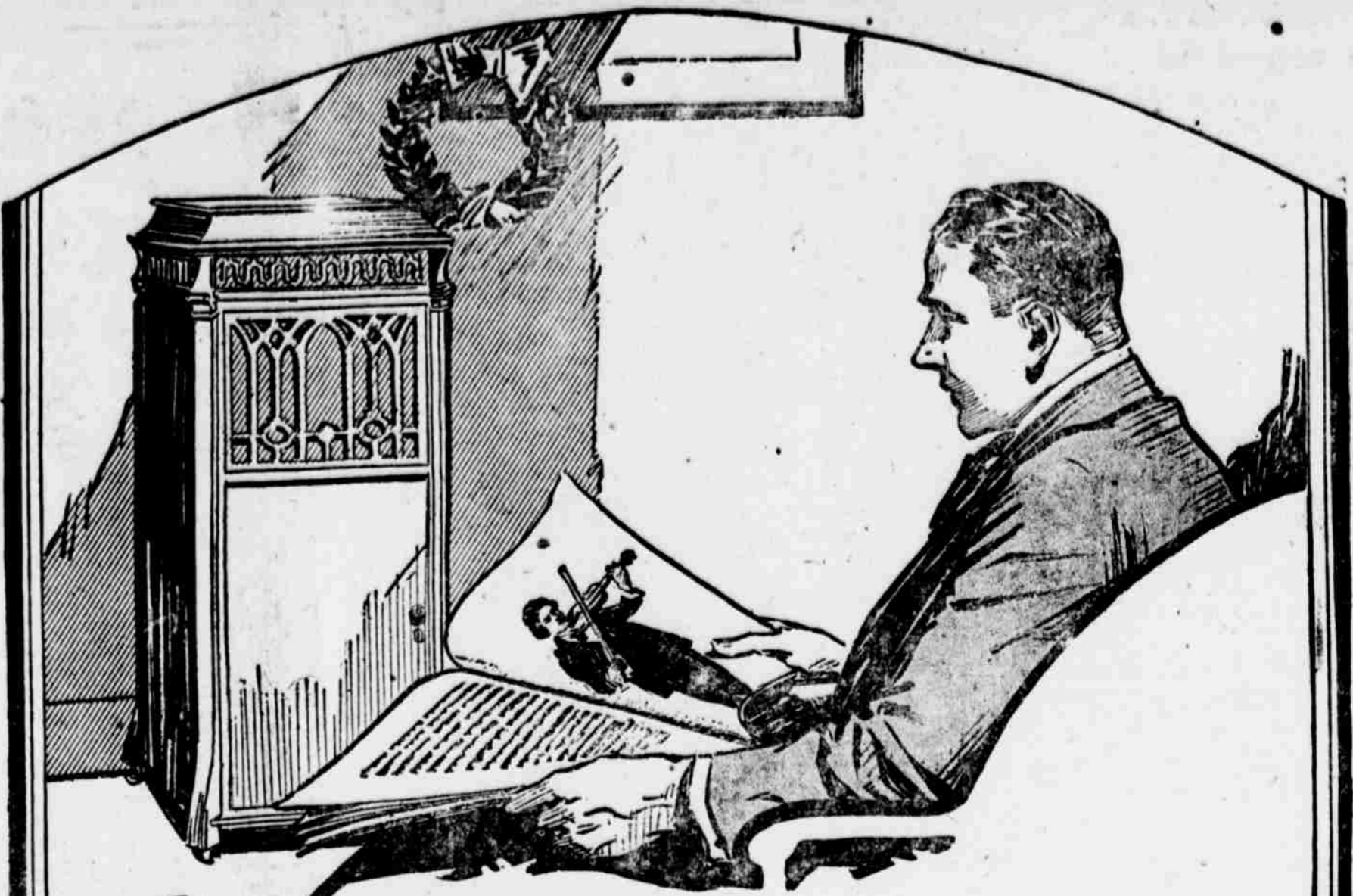

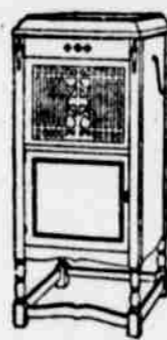

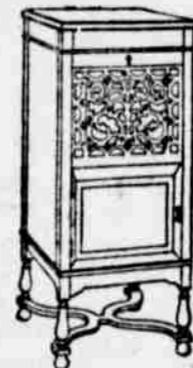

Our Street Department has in service five two-ton, Model "J" Reo trucks and one Model "S" Reo roadster.

The two trucks first purchased, equipped with Lee automatic side dump 3-yard steel bodies entered service April 2, 1918. One of these was wrecked August 8, 1918 and replaced August 24, 1918.

On July 26, 1918, our Special Garbage Truck entered service, equipped with a wooden body designed to carry 120 garbage cans of one cubic foot each.

On March 26 and April 9, 1919 two more trucks entered service. These are equipped with 3-yard Woods' hydraulic hoist rear dump steel bodies.

The roadster entered service May 14, 1918.

These trucks have hauled crushed stone, sand, cinders, ashes, rubbish and garbage continuously over paved and unpaved streets and alleys in all kinds of weather.

The consumption of gas and oil has been very low, the repairs small, and I consider the results remarkably good.

I am told the Model "F" truck, in service from March 26, 1919, equipped with hand hoist rear dump steel body and operated by the Sewer Department is giving equally good results.
