Geometry, Theory and Art, Grammar, Physiology.
Second Day—Afternoon
Music, Geography, Mental Arithmetic, History.

First Day—Forenoon
Trigonometry, Chemistry.
First Day—Afternoon
English Literature, General History, Zoology.
