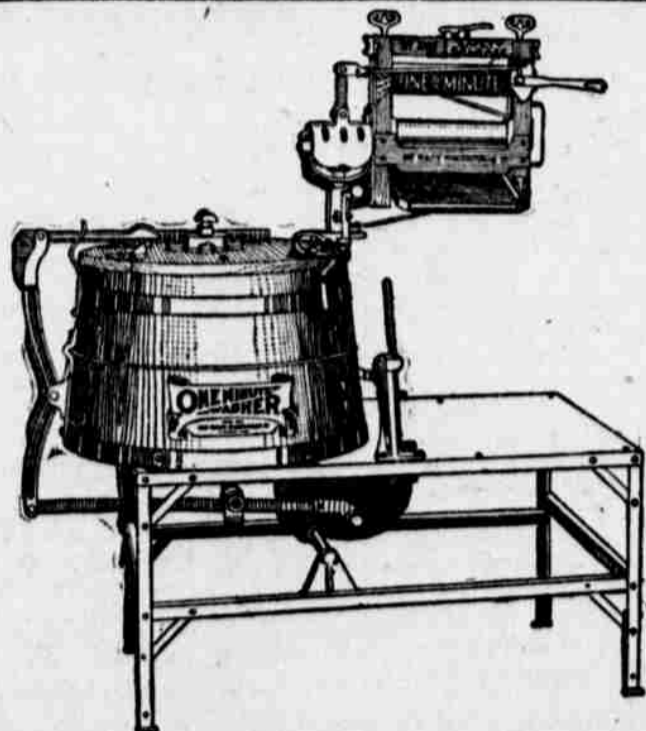

### EUROPEAN RELIEF COUNCIL

At the urgent request of the European Relief Council, an organization is being perfected in Webster county to provide the county's quota for the relief of the starving children of Eastern and Central Europe.

The European Relief Council, of which Herbert Hoover is national chairman, includes eight separate organizations, among them being the American Red Cross, the American Relief Administration, the Y. M. C. A., the Y. W. C. A., the K. of C., and others.

An appalling emergency exists in these European countries, where at least three and one-half million children are face to face with disease and starvation. It is proposed to save as many as possible from starvation by giving those whose need is most imperative one meal a day. Then there is need of medical aid, clothing and food. \$33,000,000 is required to do this work, relieving only the critical cases. \$10 will save the life of a child until next harvest.

Webster county's share of this fund is only \$3200. It is believed that there should be no difficulty in raising this amount or even more.

### Nebraskan Has Well Equipped Stock Ranch

On a recent trip to Nebraska one of our Kansas City representatives had a very pleasant visit with Alf E. Nolan of Red Cloud. Mr. Nolan operates the old Miner ranch, which comprises over 1,000 acres of good Republican River land, part of which is in cultivation and the balance in grazing land. With this combination Mr. Nolan has an abundance of feed at all seasons of the year, and in that particular section of the country they usually raise good crops. This is an ideal stock ranch, well equipped. One of its features is a good winter feed lot with lots of room, well drained, well protected from the winter weather, situated as it is in a draw. At present Mr. Nolan is feeding 200 good quality light cattle which make a very picturesque sight especially at feed time when they are all lined up along the feed troughs. Mr. Nolan also has a very nice herd of pure bred Hereford cattle. A view extending for miles up and down the river which can be seen from the ranch house affords a wonderful treat for anyone with an eye for beautiful scenery.—Clay, Robinson & Company Live Stock Report.
