### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MET ON TUESDAY

The County Board of Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment at 10:30 a. m. with all members present.

John W. Ely, President of the Commercial Club of Guide Rock accompanied by a committee from said club appeared before the Board and asked that the playing of Sunday base ball be permitted in Guide Rock precinct.

On motion by Chaplin, seconded by Shidler the following resolution was made and passed:

Resolved, That the playing of Sunday base ball be permitted in Guide Rock precinct. Said games to be conducted in accordance with House Roll No. 200 passed by the 1919 legislature of Nebraska.

At 2 o'clock, the time set for the opening of Bridge bids for the year 1921 the same were opened and read by the Clerk. The following firms were bidders: Illinois Steel Bridge Co., Western Bridge and Construction Co., Allied Contractors Inc.

After a careful comparison of the bids it was found that the Allied Contractors Inc. were the lowest bidders. Motion made by Chaplin and seconded by Stumphenhorst that the Allied Contractors Inc. be awarded the contract for the building of whatever bridges are necessary for Webster county for the year 1921. Motion carried.

On motion the County Treasurer was instructed to take up the 1920 protest tax receipt of the Farmers' Union store of Bladen and reduce their personal assessment by the sum of \$140,000.00 (actual value) refunding to them the proper amount of tax overpaid and issue regular tax receipt for the remainder.

On motion the County Treasurer was instructed to take up the 1920 protest tax receipt of Adolph Nezeychleb and reduce his real estate assessment on improvements on the N. E. 1/4 of sec. 12-4-9 from \$5000 to \$1500 (actual value) and to refund Mr. Nezeychleb the amount overpaid and issue him the regular tax receipt for the remainder.

The appointment of W. E. Bean as assessor for Inavale precinct to fill vacancy caused by the resignation of O. C. Cochrane was approved by the Board.
