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Officers Get 2 Stills Monday

O. D. Hedge, one of the State Deputy Sheriffs, and Sheriff Huffer, Monday, secured search warrants and set out to run down a few clues on suspect locations of "Stills". The first place visited was the Fentress residence in the south part of town, where they located an equipment and a quantity of "mash" and took into custody the two operators, Murvel Fentress and Ryan Birkner. They were brought before Judge Ranney and charged with the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. Birkner plead guilty of the manufacture of the same and paid a fine of \$100. Fentress plead guilty on both the manufacture and sale of the liquor and was fined \$100 on each count and being unable to deliver the cash to the Judge he is now a guest of the Sheriff.

They next visited the Tom Killough farm, 9 miles north and 1 mile east of Guide Rock, where a complete, but crude, "still" was found, also about 65 gallons of mash. A small quantity of grape juice was also confiscated. Killough was fined \$200 and costs, \$19, which he paid. A few other clues were run down but no evidence was found.

Burglarize Meat Market

Saturday night, or early Sunday morning burglars pried open the rear door of the F. A. Hildebrandt meat market, made their way to the safe located near the front of the building. The safe was not locked and they used a steel to pry open the drawer which contained \$45 and also secured a few dollars in change out of the cash register. Blood hounds were brought here from Guide Rock, Sunday afternoon, and took two trails leading from the shop but to no avail.

Early Sunday Morning Blaze

Sunday morning, about one o'clock, fire broke out from some unknown cause, in the sheds at the rear of the Beck Pool Hall, in the Turnure block. The alarm was turned in and the firemen were soon on the scene but the fire had spread so fast that the sheds were almost entirely consumed. The Farmers Independent Telephone Company and the Lincoln Telephone Company cables were damaged by the blaze, it being necessary to put in a span of cable on both lines before telephone service could be resumed on the lines operated through these cables.

BOARD OF EDUCATION ELECTS NEW TEACHERS

Pursuant to adjournment of March 7th, the Board of Education met in special session Friday evening, March 11, with all members present. President Hoxsey in the chair.

Motion made by Overing, seconded and carried, that hereafter all non-resident pupils before being allowed to register should make arrangements with the secretary relative to tuition fees which should be paid in advance. Also on motion of Overing the secretary was instructed to take what action he deemed necessary to collect delinquent fees. If parties failed to pay after ample notice had been given, suit could be brought, and the delinquent pupil not allowed to attend school.

It was brought to the attention of the Board that certain parties had taken up their residence in the city just for the school months, while the head of the family lived on the homestead outside of the district, just in order to escape paying tuition fees. It was the opinion of the Board that these parties should pay and the secretary was instructed to further investigate such cases and report on same.

Motion made by Pope, seconded by Perry, that the Board now proceed to elect by informal ballot the City Superintendent of Schools. The result being, I. N. Clark three; Kretzinger two; Kennedy one.

On a formal ballot being taken Clark received five votes and Kennedy one. On motion of Sherwood, Clark was declared to be the unanimous choice of the Board and he was elected at a salary of \$2700.00 per year for ten months service.

The teachers' committee, consisting of Sherwood, Overing and Pope, made a report and recommended the election of the following teachers:

Senior High School—Myrtle Gelwick, Principal; Mabel Hamilton, Normal Training; Jessie Kellogg, History; Helen M. Reiher, Mathematics; Cecilia Peterson, Domestic Science; Margaret Miner, Commercial; Mrs. F. R. Hughes, Music.

Junior High School—Fannie Hutchins, Principal; Edythe Beezley, Geography and History; Elsie Post, English.

Grade School—Kathryn Burke, Principal; Verna Hutchins, 1st grade; Mildred Boren, 2nd grade; Nettie Springer, 4th grade; Gem White, 5th grade; Icy McNair, 6th grade; Aimee Arnold, Kindergarten; Katharine Traut, Assistant.

Motion that teachers be elected as recommended by the Committee was made and carried.

By agreement it was decided that all teachers must sign up contracts by April 1st or the positions would be considered vacant and others employed to take their places.

Board adjourned to meet at call of Secretary, C. J. Pope.
