A. B. GELWICK OF HARDY NAMED FOR SUPERINTENDENT
At a meeting of the Board of Education held in the Commercial Club rooms on Monday evening, with all members present, the object of the gathering was announced as being for the purpose of devising ways and means for the payment of the paving tax in District 4, Block 8, Original Town and for the purpose of electing a city superintendent of schools, in place of the last elector, F. W. Kretzinger, who resigned. The secretary was instructed to draw a warrant for \$1961.01 and pay the paving tax in cash out of the school fund.
An informal ballot for superintendent resulted in five votes being cast for A. B. Gelwick of Hardy and one for C. S. Gilbert of Edgar, whereupon Gelwick was declared to be the unanimous choice and duly elected at a salary of \$2700.00 for ten months service. His acceptance has been received by Secretary Pope.
Before adjourning the Board voted to have printed blank forms to be used in the notification of the teachers of their election.

Seven delegates were chosen from Nebraska to attend the National Convention in Chicago on April 6, where this marketing plan will be further discussed and voted upon and directors for the National Organization will be elected.
Several Webster county men including the three delegates, Ira Wagoner, Dan Garber and H. G. Keeney, who were chosen by the Farmers' Union at the quarterly meeting at Guide Rock, were in attendance at Lincoln. Every county in this state was represented by the Farmers' Union yet despite this fact H. G. Keeney was chosen as the man to represent the Farmers' Union at the National Convention in Chicago.
