Gravel on Federal Aid Road

The County Highway Commissioner Overing has arranged for placing twenty loads of gravel on the State and Federal Aid road on the hills north of Cowles, where there has been some trouble with soft roads while the snow was melting. This difficulty will be overcome by making the solid founda-

The village of Cowles is also graveling the road on the main street. > It has been also planned to paint numbers on all the bridges and culverts along the Federal aid road in this county. The numbers will indicate the distance from the beginning of the road at Red Cloud. Thus if a bridge is marked 15.1 it will indicate that the bridge is located fifteen and one-tenth miles from Red Cloud.

> It might be interesting to note that the Federal road from Red Cloud to the county line north of Blue Hill cost a total of \$101,000. Of this the county paid \$16,000 being the cost of the seven bridges, and the rest of the cost was paid by the state and the federal government There are 88 culverts and bridges along the road.-Department of Public Works of Nebraska March
