Introduces Bill For Post Office Building Here
On April 14th Congressman W. E. Andrews, of the 5th District of Nebraska, introduced the following bill relative to a site and the erection of a Federal building here, the cost of which is not to exceed \$75,000.00.

This is indeed good news for the people of this city as we have out grown rented post office buildings and are entitled to a building in keeping with the other improvements that are being made from time to time here in Red Cloud.

In a letter just received from Mr. Andrews he states that he will write more at length in the near future with regard to this matter.

The Chief along with the citizens of this city hopes that the present session of Congress will see it pass this proposition so that the building may be begun this year. Reference is made to the bill which our Congressman introduced.

A BILL.
For the purchase of a site and the erection of a public building at Red Cloud, Nebraska.

Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled.

That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, authorized and directed to purchase a site, or acquire it by condemnation or otherwise, in the city of Red Cloud, Nebraska, and cause to be erected thereon a suitable building, including fireproof vaults, heating and ventilating apparatus, and approaches, not to exceed \$75,000.

The said building shall be unexposed to danger from fire by an open space of at least thirty feet on all sides, including streets and alleys.
