No further business Board now adjourned to meet Monday, June 6th.

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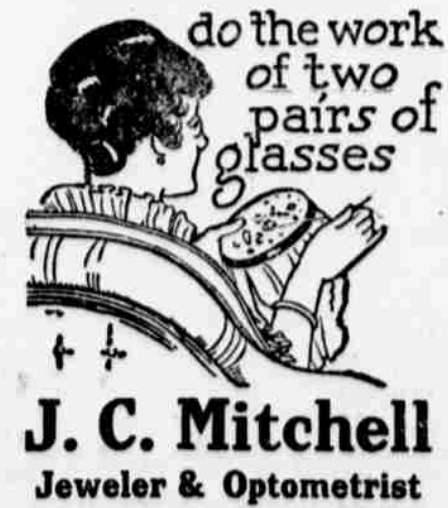
