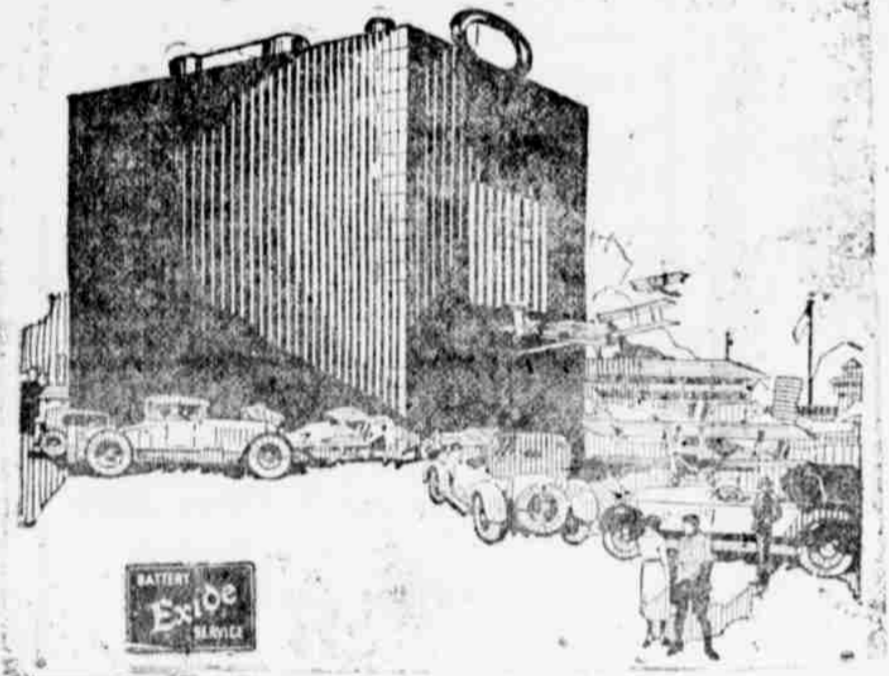

FROM A LETTER OF THE STATE SUPERINTENDENT

It is the opinion of this department that House Roll 20, the amended free high school law passed by the last legislature with the emergency clause increasing the rate of tuition from \$1.50 to \$3.00 per week, became effective the date it was signed by the governor, namely, April 25, 1921, and therefore the higher rate may be charged and collected from that date.

Senate File 220—emergency. If your district is organized under Article III or Article VI, and you wish to vote more than 35 mills and not exceeding 100 mills for general school purposes, it will be necessary to give a twenty day notice of the higher levy in a newspaper published in the county or district to the school electors before the annual or special meeting at which this is to be considered. If sixty per cent of the vote cast at such meeting shall be for the proposed levy, the board may make the levy that may be named in the notice. The amount required should be specified in dollars in notice and should be so certified to the county clerk and the county superintendent. It will also be necessary to state in the notice that this amount is in excess of 35 mills on the last completed assessed valuation of the district. School boards in Article XXII schools may levy 100 mills for general school purposes without giving this notice.

House Roll 100, which amends the compulsory education law, provides for the appointment of an enforcement officer in districts containing a city with a population of five thousand or more. In all other districts the county enforcement officer appointed by the county superintendent will have jurisdiction.

House Roll 400—Emergency. Provides for school district caucuses two weeks before the regular village election. Applies to all districts organized under Article VI containing within their boundaries an incorporated village. This law became effective April 18, 1921. Under the old law school officers in Article VI districts containing a population of more than 500 were elected at the spring election, but under this new law all Article VI districts containing an incorporated village elect their officers at the spring election. Districts containing an incorporated village with less than 500 population have been electing their officers at the annual meeting in June, but under this new law they will be elected at the village election in the spring. It, therefore, will not be legal to elect school officers in any Article VI district if it contains an incorporated village at the annual meeting next month. The two officers whose terms of office expires this year in Article VI districts containing an incorporated village, and in which their places were not filled at the spring election of 1921, will hold over, until their successors are appointed or elected. This means that they may hold over one year, or if they refuse to do so, the vacancies may be filled by appointment by the board until the next spring election at which time two officers should be elected for two years to fill out the unexpired term. This law, H. R. 400, does not apply to Article III districts not containing an incorporated village. Neither does it apply to Article XII districts. All school officers elected at the annual meeting in June or the village spring election in Article III and Article VI districts assume the duties of their office the second Monday in July following their election. School officers elected at the spring election in Article XXII districts assume their office the first Monday in May following their election.

Senate File 253—emergency. Certification of teachers. Under this law it will be more difficult to secure the emergency certificates issued by this department. There is no statutory provision for the issuance of permits by county superintendents. We, of course, are not issuing emer-
