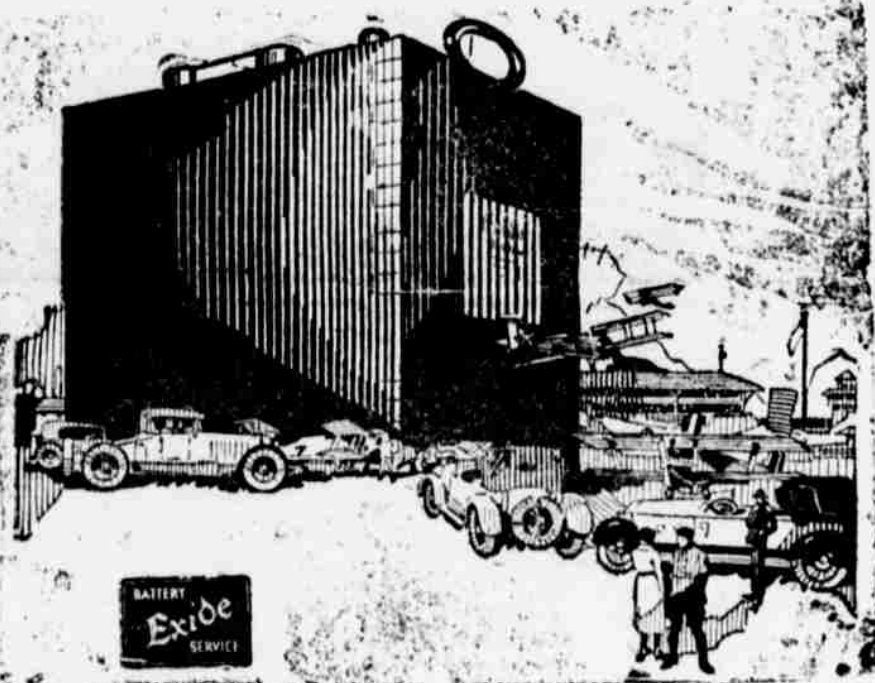

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TUBERCULOSIS ERADICATION

The United States Department of Agriculture Bureau of Animal Industry and The Nebraska Department of Agriculture Bureau of Animal Industry cooperating with the Webster County Farm Bureau have started to do area work in Webster County. Dr. Leiby has been stationed here and will make his headquarters at the Farm Bureau Office, Red Cloud.

Dr. Leiby started his work last week in Guide Rock and Beaver Creek Townships. 140 head were tested on 15 farms, 4 re-actors were found. These were appraised at \$50.00 to \$90.00 each. They will be shipped to market and the owners will receive the salvage, this amount to be deducted from the appraised price and the owner will stand a third of this remaining amount. The Federal Department and State Department will pay the owner one-third each indemnity. Same not to exceed \$100.00 on a purebred and \$50.00 on a grade animal.

The eradication of tuberculosis is being carried on in this county free to the farmers and every farmer should be interested and help to eradicate tuberculosis by having his cattle tested. No farmer wants a reactor in his herd especially if this animal is a spreader of the disease, as it may spread from cattle to hogs, poultry and even to humans. For that reason it is very important that we eradicate tuberculosis from cattle. STATE FARM BUREAU NOTES

Samples of the U. S. Government harness, which is being sold through the county farm bureaus, has been received by the state headquarters and can be seen at the office at 1543 O Street, Lincoln.

Officers of the U. S. Grain Growers Inc. will meet with representatives of farmers cooperative elevator concerns of Nebraska at Omaha on June 6 and 7. The object is a further perfection of the plan of the U. S. Grain Growers, Incorporated. Similar meetings will be held in Kansas City on June 2 and 3 and in St. Paul, Minnesota, June 9 and 10.

State Tax Commissioner, W. H. Osborne has again addressed a communication to all county clerks requesting that the county tax rolls be published in the newspapers. Farmers generally are behind Osborne in the request. Everything the farmer has, his farm, horses, cattle, machinery, and grain are visible assets and carry the full burden of taxation. On the other hand merchandise and other forms of more invisible property has been "getting by" the assessor regularly in the years past. The publication of these tax rolls is bound to shift some of this burden where it properly belongs.

During the last week in June meetings will be held in each precinct in which the farm bureau is organized for the purpose of getting behind the movement for an agricultural foreign trade financing corporation. The movement was started by James R. Howard, President of the American Farm Bureau federation and a plan has been submitted by Carl Vrooman, former assistant secretary of agriculture. The plan, primarily is to get behind a bill introduced by Senator Geo. W. Norris, which provides that the \$50,000,000 profits of the wartime U. S. Grain corporation be used as capital stock for a foreign finance corporation authorized to issue debentures to a maximum of \$500,000,000 for the stimulation of European markets. Each farmer would be required to buy 10 per cent of the value of his export sales in stock in the foreign agricultural trade finance corporation. This sum to be used to repay the \$50,000,000 advanced by the government.

During the last three weeks the Nebraska Farm Bureau federation cooperating with the American Farm Bureau federation will take a referendum among its members to get a first hand idea of the sentiment of the members on a number of national questions. Community meetings will be held in each organized precinct, and a vote taken on the question of whether the members favor: financing based on bonded warehouse receipts; livestock financing based on

adequate pledge; development of a personal rural credit system; request that authority be granted the Federal Reserve Board to so classify rediscounts as to give priority to loans for basic productions of all kinds; increasing the limit on Federal Land Bank mortgage loans from \$10,000 to \$25,000; asking Congress to submit to the states a constitutional amendment prohibiting the issuance of all tax-free securities; continuing the excess profits tax; as to the enactment of a General Sales Tax; the placing of packers under government regulation vesting in the Department of Agriculture; building of farm-to-market roads prior to the construction of trans-continental high ways; development of the Great Lakes—St. Lawrence waterway; making illegal the practice of short-selling in agricultural products; truth in fabric legislation; enabling legislation for cooperative marketing; and asking members if they will be able to move materially large amounts of agricultural products if the American Farm Bureau federation secures an adequate reduction in freight rates.

CALIFORNIA EXPERT TO ADDRESS WHEAT GROWERS

Arrangement has been made for the most important meeting ever held in Nebraska. When Mr. Aaron Sapiro, well known California attorney and noted expert upon community marketing of farm products will address the Nebraska Wheat Growers at their state meeting, June 7th, at Holdrege in Auditorium at 2:00 p. m.

Bankers and business men are especially invited to attend this conference in that the prosperity of the wheat grower determines the prosperity of all other business in an agricultural country. The Nebraska meeting is one of the series now being held in the Western wheat states extending from Texas to Canada and West. Directed by the National Wheat Growers Association with headquarters at Wichita, Kansas.

These Western wheat states are fast reaching their minimum sign up which provides for pooling entire wheat crops for a period of five years, this method however, does not appeal to the big grain gamblers and is a sure remedy for the evils as practiced by the Chicago Board of Trade, in that the wheat will be merchandised instead of being dumped upon the open market.

This plan saved the fruit growers in the state of California, was used successfully by Northwest Wheat Growers Association last year, since they have doubled their sign up for the coming crop. It is also to be used by the twelve cotton states of the south in handling their cotton this year.

All farm organizations, including farm bureaus, farmers union, grains and departments of agriculture have assisted the Southern farmer under
