"Yes."

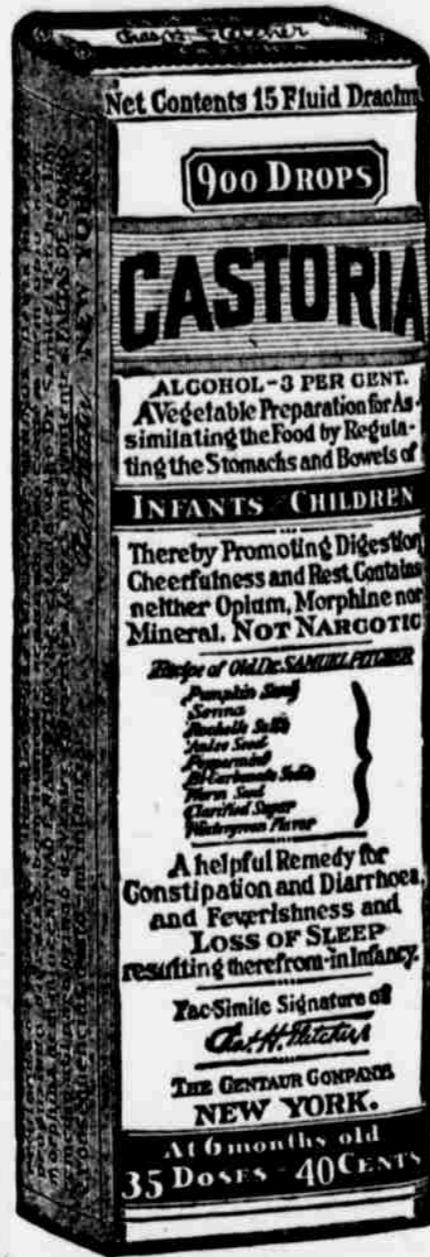
"Well, that's me."
