ANNOUNCEMENT—RED CLOUD CITY SCHOOLS

School will open Monday, Sept. 5th. Junior and Senior High school students will enroll and check credits Friday, Sept. 2nd, 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Non-resident students are required (in accordance with the law) to show certificate permitting free attendance or pay one semester's tuition in advance. (H. S. tuition \$54.00 per semester, Grade tuition \$27.00 per semester) before being allowed to enroll. Tuition to be paid to the Superintendent.

Dom. Sci. and Manual Training fees (\$3.00 per semester) must be paid at the time of enrollment. Students must elect on a definite course for their high school work and will not be allowed to change after enrolling.

All students will be required to register in the Academic course (College Preparatory) unless accompanied by their parent or guardian, or presenting written permission to enroll in one of the Special courses (English, Normal Training or Commercial).

Students are required to carry four subjects except by special permission. Only those students whose grades have averaged 90% or better will be allowed to carry more than four subjects.

Credit will be given for Music with professional private teachers under the conditions established by the State Department of Education.

Only those students who are in good standing (having made three credits in the preceding semester) and who have a passing mark (70%) in three subjects may be eligible to participate in school Athletics. The following Courses of Study are offered:

TWELFTH GRADE Required— American History English VII Elective Elective Note—Graduates of this course will be admitted to the State University or any College of equal rank without examination.

NORMAL TRAINING

Grammar and Composition Pub. Sch. Music—6 weeks Note—Normal Training students are urged to combine Normal Training with the Academic course by electing two years foreign language. This permits a student to enter college upon graduation without examination.
