September in Nebraska

As the farmers and townfolk from all sections of the state motor along the highways toward the capital city to attend the state fair and return homeward again, they will not fail to note the volume of production. Nebraska leads this year. Gradually the state has moved upward among its sisters as an agricultural producing ground. She stands next to Kansas in winter wheat production this year, and Kansas has long held first position in the nation. Nebraska's corn condition outclasses all other states this year. Federal statistics show that Nebraska is not surpassed by any other state in the combined yield of agricultural and livestock products. Diversified production is Nebraska's great advantage—Nebraska that within the memory of many of its citizens living today was not regarded as suitable for agriculture. Farm Bureau Notes

SEED TREATMENT FOR STINKING SMUT (BUNT) IN WHEAT.
Soaking Method—Run the seed thru a good fanning mill before treatment. This will remove many of the shriveled and light weight kernels, spore balls, many of the free smut spores, and dirt. Make up a solution consisting of 1 pint Formalin to 35 gallons of water. Put the seed in loosely filled burlap sacks, dip into the barrels or tanks to prevent wasting the solution. Place the seed on a clean floor or canvas, and cover with sacks or canvas for two hours. Dry by spreading in a thin layer and stirring occasionally with a shovel. If the seed is sown when swollen, open the drill to offset this. Disinfect the drill with a one to 10 solution of Formalin. It is recommended that Formalin in sealed bottles be purchased. Sprinkling methods—This method is not as effective as the soaking method and is not to be recommended when the soaking method can be used. Where the wheat is only slightly affected and it is run thru a fanning mill with a good air blast to remove the spore balls this method may be successfully used. Sprinkle on the seed a solution of one pint of formalin to 35 gallons of water, using about one gallon to the bushel, shoveling over at the same time to make sure of uniform wetting. Cover in a pile with bags or canvas and handle as in the soaking method. The effectiveness of this treatment depends on the thorough wetting of each seed. If the seed is swollen, open the drill to offset this. Disinfect the drill with a one to 10 solution of Formalin. It is recommended that Formalin in sealed bottles be purchased.

Ordinance No. 45

An Ordinance providing additional penalties for the violation of Ordinance No. 32, and for the removal of any building erected in violation of the provisions of said Ordinance.

Be it Ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Red Cloud, Nebraska:

Section 1. Any lot owner who erects a building in violation of the provisions of said Ordinance No. 32, or permit the same to be erected or remain on said lot, shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not exceeding One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) and each day's maintenance of said building shall constitute a distinct offense.

Section 2. The Mayor is hereby instructed to cause the immediate removal of such building.
