COUNTY SCHOOL NOTES

(By County Superintendent)

Mr. Boner has been appointed trustee officer for Webster county. At the State Fair Hazel Whaley's card in pencil drawing took third premium. Helen Johnson's poster took third premium, and Stella Hindenach's card in free hand cutting took fifth premium.

This year I will try to give an added premium of thirty dollars among the schools that can gain first premium at the State Fair, no school to get more than ten dollars in case there are only a few gaining first premium. I think it would be best for four or five schools to join together and buy one hundred sheets of mounting boards and mount their own exhibits and classify them. Then they will be entered as they intend and if any mistakes are made they will feel better about it than if it is due to some oversight of the county superintendent. When one person mounts the work for the whole county it is not done as well as if more people were concerned and the responsibility is too great. Your wishes are not always carried out. The specimens can be classified on the back for the State Fair, the Bladen Fair and the Farmers' Institute.

Last year some of the teachers made between twenty five and thirty dollars in premiums. There was some beautiful work sent in to the Fair but it did not follow the rules and so was not entered. Blue Hill had some beautiful work in penmanship and watercolor that was worthy. This year I wish that the premium lists were carefully studied for I think there was work handed in that was very fine. This is the first year we have sent in any work so it wasn't so bad but we want some first premiums. This same material will be sent to the Farmers' Institute together with any other work that is brought in from this year's work. There are still places for any teachers that have certificates in Arthur county, Lincoln county, Perkins county and McPherson county. There should be some places for emergency teachers soon so any such wanting place might write telling what their shortage consists in.


