Stolen Goods Purchased By Red Cloud Citizens

Saturday night J. A. Miller's General store at Burr Oak, Kansas was broken into and robbed of from \$2500 to \$3000 worth of dress goods, silks, ladies coats, shoes, etc. The thieves were traced to this city and on Sunday morning commencing at 8 o'clock it is said there were as high as twenty automobile loads of men down at the open air sale on the road along the Romjue farm south east of this city. A large number of the price tags were found on this road and also at the end of the road near the river bank. The tags were written by Mr. Miller and absolutely identified as having come from his goods.

Sheriff John Cole of Jewell county phoned at 11 o'clock and informed Deputy Sheriff Boner of the robbery, and after a little investigation he discovered that goods were being sold here and phoned the officers in Jewell county who together with Mr. Miller came to this city but the birds had flown.

A few of the old goods were found in a straw stack and during the past few days a number of search warrants have been issued and several homes were visited by the officers where some of the goods were found and identified which had been purchased by some of the residents of this city at very low prices. It seems that this robbery was a pre-planned affair as some of the citizens of this community who purchased stolen goods seemed to have been informed before hand inasmuch as some of them were on hand at eight o'clock Sunday morning to make purchases.

Some of the citizens are blaming Sheriff Huffer because the thieves were not captured that day and we want to say in justice to this officer that he was on the road with Geo. Harris' automobile from Hutchinson, Kansas, and did not arrive home until nearly supper time at which time he met Sheriff Cole and Mr. Miller who informed him of the robbery. He together with officers and others have been working diligently on this case.

It is also said that the goods that were stolen from Zeigler's store at Riverton last week were brought here but as yet they have not been found.

For the past twenty years this city has been a "fence" for disposing of stolen goods and the thieves have escaped. If the law abiding citizens here would help the authorities instead of criticizing them no doubt this gang could be brought to justice, and also take a jaunt to the state penitentiary where rightly they belong.

Married at Blue Hill

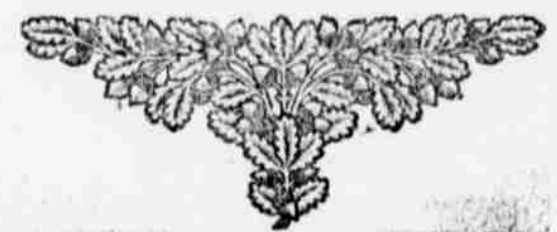

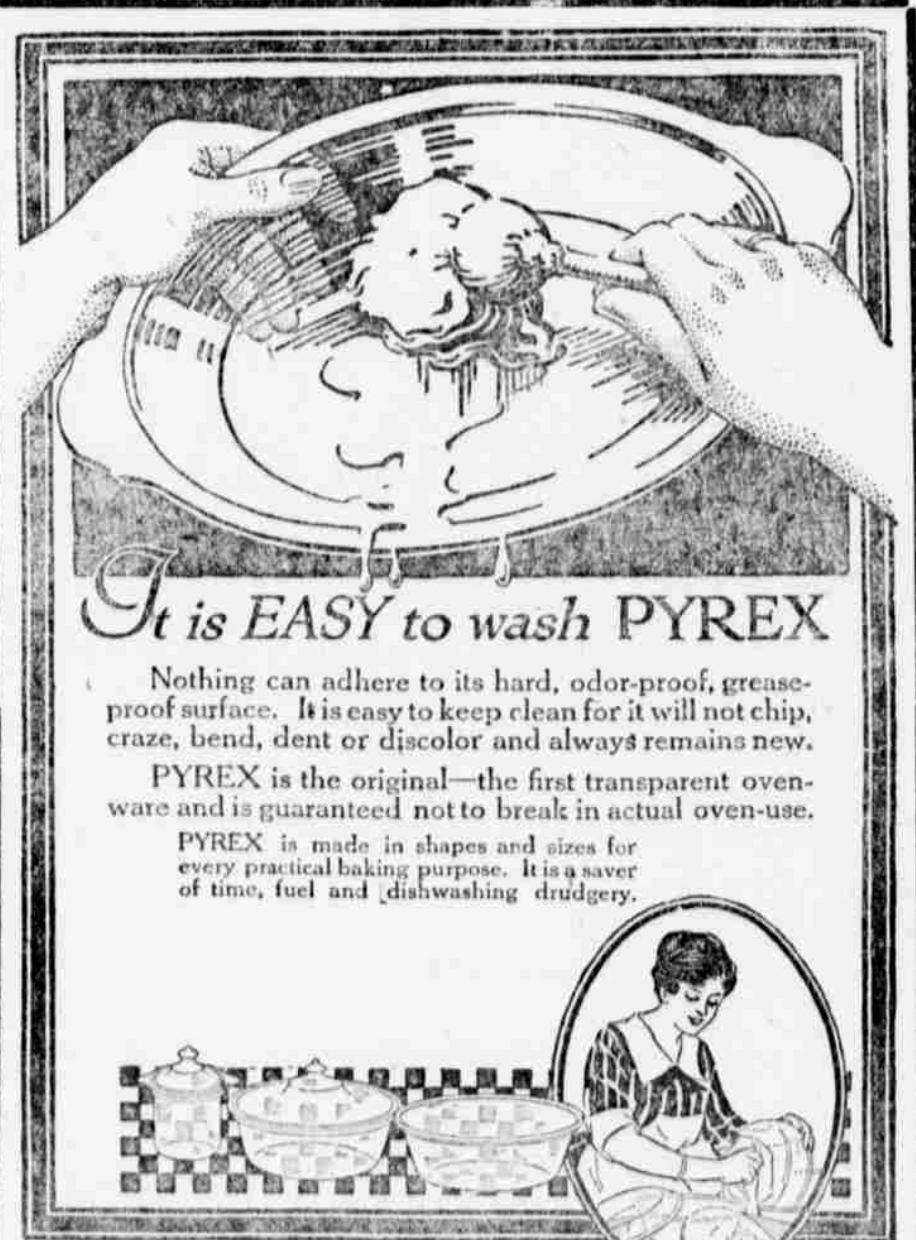
