The Old Settlers Picnic

Many people enjoyed, the picnic with the old settlers at Cowles, last Thursday. They grew reminiscent while eating their basket dinners in the beautiful grove and found out many interesting facts of early days.

This picnic drew together a crowd of young settlers also, as well as the old, and all felt they had something in common on that day.

Growing old is really an intricate problem. You can't always tell by gray hair, because many people may have had sudden frights or sickness and turned gray suddenly. But a tendency to reminisce and to tell the world how much better things were when you were young is a straw that shows which way the years are blowing. But there is a certain restfulness about growing old and we noticed the Old Settlers' calm ways—no more keeping up with the times, going to dances, when you'd rather stay at home; no strenuous hikes; no more wild flashes of ambition and yearning to have your name carved in the Hall of Fame. Each home, then, even tho a sod house, was a place of friendship, quiet talk, ideal family life, and later on, of dreams come true. They thought of their neighbors as themselves, with gain to all, and loss to none, if possible.

Those old settlers have since become our great men here. We admire, more and more, their grit and perseverance in making this county what it is today. It has been the place of our destiny and how we should like it and revere those that made it such.

It was a great delight to have Miss Willa Seibert, Cather present and say a few complimentary remarks of Webster County. She has helped make this section of Nebraska famous.

It was voted to continue these picnics annually, and more persuasive methods will be used during the year to bring old settlers before the public more often, so as to get over their timidity in public speaking, for "flights of words are more fatal than shrapnel," as the soldier now says.
