### Notice--Stock Shippers

The State Railway Commission announce that they will hold a meeting Tuesday, October 18th, at 10 a. m., at their offices in Lincoln for conference concerning the matter of stopping cabooses or coaches, which are provided for shippers, at convenient places upon arrival of stock shipments at their destination, or where stoppage is made for feeding or for loading, or for change of cars.

The law is very clear in the matter of coaches or cabooses which have been provided shippers or caretakers accompanying shipments of live stock, being stopped at suitable places for their discharge and reception.

The object of this meeting will be to hear any complaints that shippers might have make with regard to this matter. Representatives of the carriers will be present. The commission contemplates making a personal investigation as to the practice of the carriers concerning this matter at the important stopping points and terminals.
