THE RED CLOUD CHIEF

Over 8,000,000 bushels of grain are involved in the 2,814 grower contracts secured in Nebraska today by the U. S. Grain Growers, Inc., according to an official announcement by the state organizer. This represents an average of 301,146. According to the announcement this is one third of the number of bushels to be secured before the national sales department will take steps to establish terminal elevator facilities and a sales agency in the zone including Nebraska. Local leaders are hopeful that the necessary 25,000,000 bushel mark will be reached soon after the first of the year.

One of the features of the week's campaign was the securing of 39 grower contracts near Wead, the former home of C. H. Gustafson, president of the U. S. Grain Growers. C. D. Jenkins, solicitor, working in the immediate vicinity of the former Gustafson home, secured seven contracts without a miss in three hours last Monday morning.

Excellent results were secured by solicitors in other parts of the state, according to J. A. Crawford, assistant state organizer. Win. Bart of Tobias, working at Wead secured 4 grower contracts during the six-day period and increased his aggregate to 252, giving him a safe lead over the other solicitors. Waitstill continues to lead the other cooperative elevators in the number of individual contracts with 110.

A recapitulation from national headquarters shows that the U. S. Grain Growers has a total membership of 18,750, which is an increase for the past week of 1713. The number of elevators signed now stands at 570 an increase of 32 for the week. Illinois holds the lead with 5,284 and North Dakota second with 4,500. Nebraska ranks an easy third with Oklahoma fourth with over 1,700.

While the membership campaign did not open in Iowa until this week, A. L. Middleton's crew of solicitors, schooled last week at Nevada, scored their first victory when a contract with the cooperative elevator at Nevada was signed Wednesday night as a climax to the three day meeting. Mr. Middleton will be assisted in the campaign by T. A. Hougas, former president of the Farmers' Union in Iowa.

WEST IN LIMELIGHT

New York World Lauds Nebraska and Its Metropolis for Landing Air Classic.

Omaha, Neb.—Omaha and Nebraska have been placed on the map as "wide awake." The New York World placed them there immediately after the Omaha Aero club had obtained the Pulitzer Trophy race as the feature event of the air congress to be held in Omaha November 3, 4 and 5.

This is what the eastern newspaper had to say:

"The 1921 air race for the Pulitzer trophy—the world's most important prize for speed in the upper realm—will be flown this year at Omaha."

"Announcement to this effect was made by Earl W. Porter, president of the Omaha Aero club, in the wide awake Nebraska city. Omaha gained for herself quite a victory in obtaining the Pulitzer Trophy race."
