### A. C. Hale Passes Away The Best Game This Season

Alhart Clinton Hale, who has been a resident of the county for several years and of this city for the past two years, passed away at his home last night after an illness of some five years duration. The immediate cause of his death was heart failure.

The deceased was born February 8th, 1847, at Winfield, Iowa, and was 74 years 9 months and four days old. He is survived by his wife, one son, three daughters and several other relatives. At the time of going to press, the date and hour for the funeral services have not been announced.

The most exciting athletic event it has been the pleasure of the citizens of Red Cloud to witness this year was the football game played last Friday afternoon at Hedge's field between the All Star team and the American Legion. The game was hard fought from the very beginning and intensely interesting and has been the one subject of discussion among the fans ever since.

The game started off by the Legion kicking off to the All Stars and the former team was the first to score, Rev. Newland making a drop kick from the All Stars twenty-two yard line. Later during this quarter Newhouse was on the receiving end for a forward pass and succeeded in crossing the Legion goal making a touchdown, the All Stars failing to kick goal, score 6 to 3. This quarter seemed very long to the players and at this time time keepers were selected so that the last three quarters would be played within the time limit. The balance of the game neither side were able to make much gain and the forward pass which was used by the All Stars was not very successful as it was broken up by the other team.

After the smoke of the battle cleared away Ray Mountford was found to be on the casualty list suffering from a pair of black eyes and on the morning after most of the players were limping around, many saying they felt twenty years older but they all said that it was the cleanest game that they had taken part in for many a day.

On Tuesday evening a banquet was tendered the players at the Powell & Pope Cafe and after the feed the reminiscences of the past were revived.

Next year we hope that the Legion or the young men who have graduated from the local school will organize a town team as we have the timber here for the best team in southern Nebraska.
