CITY COUNCIL HOLDS

REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING

Mayoress Mary Peterson called the Council together in regular session, with all members present, in the Council chambers, on Tuesday evening and after the minutes of the December meeting were read and approved and the report of the City Treasurer presented and placed on file the Council listened to a report of Supt. Frazier regarding a test on Deep Rock lubricating oil and the good qualities of the St. Claire Refining Co. products as explained by one of their representatives, finally voting to give the latter a thirty day test.

Out of respect for the Council the Mayoress appointed B. R. Frazier superintendent of the water and light department at a salary of \$150.00 per month, which appointment was duly confirmed by the Council.

The Mayoress stated that the town of Cowles desired to arrange to take light from the Red Cloud plant and the matter was taken under advisement.

The superintendent was instructed to procure an extra transformer for use at the Auditorium, W. J. Linn to pay for the same and take it out in power.

It was moved and seconded that the Mayoress and Clerk be instructed to draw warrants to pay Dr. Sech \$3,000.00 and the Grand Island Loan & Trust Company \$2,000.00.

The following resolution was adopted:—Resolved, That the members of the City Council are, and expect to continue to be, unanimous in supporting the authority of the Mayor over all the appointees of the city and any violation of the orders of the Mayor by any of the appointees will be deemed by the Council sufficient cause for his removal by the Mayor, and the appointment of his successor.

New "Peace" Dollar Will Be Out Tuesday

Washington, D. C., Dec. 31.—The new silver dollar of the 1921 design—the peace dollar—will be ready for distribution Tuesday. It was said today at the treasury. Coinage of the new dollar is being rushed by the Philadelphia mint, officials said. The first dollar of the new series struck off has been presented to President Harding.

The new dollar has the head of liberty on one side and on the other a dove upon a mountain top, clutching an olive branch, struck by the rays of the sun, with the word "peace" beneath it. This is the first change in the design of the dollar since 1878, officials said, and will remain as the design of the dollar for twenty-five years, unless changed by legislation.

About 500,000 of the new dollars probably will be coined with the date of 1921 and after that the dollar will carry date of the year in which it is struck off. Efforts are being made, it was explained, to complete the coinage of at least a half million of the new dollars with the 1921 date in order to avoid a scarcity of the coin which would result in a premium being placed upon them by numismatists.

There will be in all about \$180,000,000 of the new design coined, officials said. Coinage of silver dollars ceased in 1901. It was explained, when the silver purchases authorized by the Sherman act had been completed, but it was resumed again in February of this year, when the purchase of silver was begun under the Pittman act to replace the dollars melted and sold to the British government during the war.—Sunday World Herald.

The bridal couple spent Christmas day at the Drew home, attending church both morning and evening, the groom being the pastor's guest in pulpit in the morning and offering the prayer.

Their home will be in Bethany until June, when Mr. Saladen will graduate from the University.
