Leaders' Expect Bonus Bill Will Pass by March Washington, Jan. 9.—"Soldier bonus before the end of March," is to be the slogan of house and senate leaders, who this week will begin work on the long delayed plan for compensation to World war veterans. With President Harding finally and definitely committed to the bonus congressional leaders who attended the White house dinner Saturday night, stated Sunday that nothing stood in the way of early bonus legislation. It was the president's personal interest last fall which pigeonholed the ad justed compensation bill in the senate after it had passed the house by an overwhelming majority. The opposition by the executive is now a thing of the past, and the only question confronting the administration is "how can we raise the money?" The plan which immediately suggested itself as placing the least strain upon the treasury was to allow refunding of the \$10,000,000,000 foreign debt to meet the bonus payments. Whether or not such a scheme is feasible will be decided this week, when Chairman Fordney and the house ways and means committee will meet to prepare a tentative draft of bonus legislation.—Tuesday's Denver Post. Assessment is Made On Banks of State Lincoln, Nebraska, January 7th.—To bring the state bank guaranty fund trained of nearly \$4,000,000 during the last two years by thirty bank failures, up to the legal 1 per cent of average aggregate deposits, the state department of trade and commerce has just made a special assessment of \$1,456,261 against the 986 state banks in Nebraska. At the same time the department levied the regular semi-annual assessment of one twentieth of 1 per cent which brings \$109,394.63 more into the fund. The fund is now bolstered from \$731,235.56 up to \$2,346,470.93. Average deposits in all the banks for the six months ending last November on which the assessments were made amounted to \$219,031,860.30. In addition to regular assessments which the law fixes at one twentieth of 1 per cent, to be made twice a year until the fund shall have reached one and a half per cent of deposits, four special assessments have been levied since 1919. All of them were to bring the fund up to the required 1 per cent. The four levies were: December, 1919 \$511,658.35 December, 1920 346,811.32 June, 1921 558,833.20 January 1922 1,456,261.92
