He had been out to Denver and examined the books of the company and also had given the prospects at Bellaire his careful consideration. He stated that the condition of the company's books was all that could be desired and that he was considerably impressed with the prospects at Bellaire. A Mr. Myers, of Colorado, an officer of the company was also present and expressed himself as very favorably impressed with the conditions. It looks like oil for Bellaire if they can just make the arrangements that will enable them to bore through the remaining strata of rock.—Smith County Journal.
