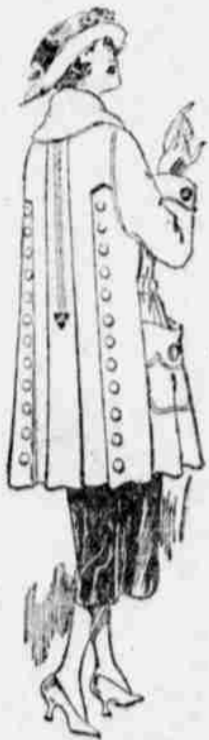

Arrangements are being made to install wireless receiving equipment at the Besse Auditorium of the latest approved type in the immediate future. Manager Linn announces that if not delayed in getting the necessary apparatus everything will be ready to receive messages by the first of May.

This is a move certainly to be commended. Market reports, latest news as well as concerts are now sent out by wireless telephone from the large sending stations in the cities. A receiving set here will be able to catch messages from Kansas City, Denver and Omaha with great ease. During the next season news of all the league base ball games as well as the market reports, high class musical productions and other matters of great interest will be flashed out by wireless. Amplifiers will be included in the apparatus making it possible to hear the radio messages anywhere in the building. No sending equipment will be installed at the present time.
