The County Board of Commissioners met as per adjournment at 10 o'clock p. m. with all members present.

Two petitions were presented to the Board from Potsdam precinct for the appointment of an assessor to fill vacancy caused by the death of E. H. Funke Sr. After considering the number of signatures to each petition a motion was made by Stumpfenhorst seconded by Chaplin that Otto Mueller be appointed to fill this vacancy. Motion carried.

The Board expected to meet the Division Engineer at this meeting to arrange and decide on the Budget necessary for the maintenance of the Federal roads for 1922. A telephone message was received from the Division Engineer stating that he could not meet the Board at this meeting and set April 3rd as the date when he would meet with Board and arrange this matter.

In regard to the 1921 assessment of the Marsh Hardware Stock in Guide Rock the County Treasurer was instructed to reduce their assessment to the sum of \$4000.00.

On motion made and carried John Hanson was appointed Road Overseer of District No. 11 B.
