### COUNTY COMMISSIONERS MET ON TUESDAY

The County Board of Commissioners met as per adjournment of March 21st with all members present.

On motion made and carried the Superintendent of Poor Farm was allowed to employ a hired girl for the balance of the year.

The County Treasurer was instructed to strike from the tax list the 1921 per assessment of John Zuberhelder in Beaver Creek precinct. Same being a double assessment.

The bond of Warren Thomas as Road Overseer of District No. 6 was approved by Board.

The principal object of this meeting of the Board was to arrange the Budget as required by law, for the maintenance of the State Highway system in Webster county. Mr. C. E. Wright the Division Engineer of the Department of Public works was present and after a lengthy discussion of road matters in general, the Budget for 1922 was arranged and approved by both parties and filed with County Clerk. Using 1921 figures as a guide it was estimated that the receipts from auto licenses for 1922 would amount to \$23,331.62 of this amount approximately \$6649.01 would go to the County Draggage Fund.

The sum of not to exceed \$7961.98 to be expended on Federal Highway north from Red Cloud to Adams county line, \$2075.64 on road west from Red Cloud to Franklin county line. For construction and maintenance of road east from Red Cloud to Nuckolls county line the sum of \$6000.00. A part of the unexpended money not necessary to be used on above mentioned roads to be used on any county roads that require attention.

The following claims were audited and allowed and County Clerk instructed to draw warrants on the proper funds in payment of same.

### Holsteins Make Good Record

Grace Homestead Johanna Payne, a Full Aged Holstein Cow, owned by Starke Brothers of Red Cloud, Nebr., is listed in the latest bulletin of "Reported Tests of Holstein Friesian Cows" which is published by Malcolm H. Gardner of Delavan, Wis. She is reported as having produced at the age of five years, 22030.1 lbs. of milk and 793.80 lbs. of butter fat, in 305 days, equivalent to 992.2 lbs. of butter.

Starke Brothers have also two other Holstein cows listed in this bulletin.

Rose Oak De Kol Burke, at the age of seven years and eleven months, is credited with a record of 20765.3 lbs. of milk and 758.81 lbs. of butter fat, in 305 days, equivalent to 448.5 lbs. of butter.

Pauline Star Ormsby, is reported as having produced in 305 days at the age of three years and one month, 19301.1 lbs of milk and 631.25 lbs. of butter fat, equivalent to 789.0 of butter.
