Webster County Sunday School Census

The Sunday Schools of Webster
County are to take a complete Sunday
School Census of the entire County a
week from next Monday, April 24th.
This census was decided on at the
County Convention of the Sunday
School Association last September.
Since that time the Committee in
charge of planning the Census has
been planning and organizing the
work. The County has been divided
into districts and a definite district
allotted each Sunday school for the
canvassing. The Sunday Schools will
divide their local districts up among
teams of two workers each who will
do the canvassing. The plan is to have
the work planned so that the whole
county can be covered in one forenoon.
At present there are thirty three Sun-
day Schools in the County affiliated
with the County Sunday School Asso-
ciation. These schools are located so
as to reach easily most of the territory
in the county. It is purposed to fol-
low the census with a County wide
"Go To Sunday School Sunday" which
every man, woman and child living in
Webster County will be specially invit-
ed to attend Sunday School and enroll
in some class for Bible Study.
