**Franklin's Love for Books.**  
Benjamin Franklin had an overpowering desire—a desire which gripped him to the end of his life, and to which he gave himself over without stint. That was a desire for books. He read omnivorously, if you know what that means—and if you don't, look it up in the dictionary. He stole time from his work and play, and leisure, and persuaded his fellow apprentices to slich books for him from their master's shops.

His first literary adventure was into Bunyan's "Pilgrim's Progress," and it was followed by every other book he could lay hold of. Of course his field was limited. In those ancient days little was published in Boston other than sermons, essays, political pamphlets and learned treatises. But Franklin didn't care whether they were interesting or not. What he was concerned with was matter for reading. He wanted to learn the language. He desired to write it and speak it more effectively than any man of his time, and he certainly attained a rank with the finest of them.

**Notable Pictures.**  
A remarkable collection of pictures, which will be more highly prized as years go by, is the series of American aeronautical photographs which ex-Major Ernest Jones, army air service, has gathered during his 15 years in this work. They cover the development of aeronautics, particularly aviation, from 1863 to 1917. The 1,800 photographs visualize the successive steps made by the Wright brothers, Curtiss, Thomas, Wittenman and other pioneers in this country. Some of these are the only pictures in existence of certain machines and events. "It is probable," says United States Air Service, "that this is the most complete collection of air photographs in America."—Exchange.

**Dehydrating Foods.**  
Preservation of foods in the home by dehydration has been made possible, says Popular Mechanics Magazine, by the production of an ovenlike arrangement manufactured by a New York company. In operating, a number of trays containing the food to be dehydrated, are placed in the apparatus, while underneath these is a pan, or humidifier, having a certain amount of water in it, and which has been previously heated to the proper temperature.

Twenty-two thousand dollars' worth is a lot of pants pressing, but that's what the annual statement of a leading Chicago hotel put before the board of directors, showed as one operating item. There were soft drinks and other beverages listed at \$90,516.70; barber and boots, \$16,714.50; laundry, \$19,613.16, and telephone calls \$87,452.99. Those were just the few little things. The hotel itself took in \$1,157,834.56, and the restaurants \$1,115,831.91. The grand total, up to the earnings (title amounts, to \$2,400,421.20. Against the gross income the balance sheet shows expenses of \$2,424,634.91, a superficial loss of \$24,213.71.

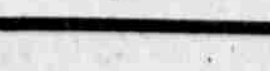
