Kansas City Chamber of Commerce Coming May 11

Kansas City, Missouri, April 12, 1922. One hundred and twenty-five members of the Chamber of Commerce of Kansas City will visit Red Cloud, Neb. May 11th on a special train to be known as the "Chamber of Commerce of Kansas City Special". It will be the Thirty-First Annual Trade Extension Trip of the Kansas City Chamber.

The tour, which will last seven days, will be an expression of Kansas City's confidence in the future, and in the great empire of which Kansas City is a part.

The purpose of the trip will be to become better acquainted with the business men in the towns to be covered, meeting old friends and making new ones among the business men of Kansas City's trade territory.

Red Cloud, Nebr., will be one of the seventy-four towns to be visited on the tour. The itinerary covers 1,588 miles, includes parts of three different lines of railroad and covers towns in Nebraska, Wyoming, Colorado and Kansas.

All left the Auditorium feeling highly pleased with the program and we hope impressed with the necessity of encouraging such organizations as the Community Chorus as a means of high class entertainment and the promotion of a better community spirit.

Starke Farms Colantha Homestead, a purebred Holstein cow, owned by Starke Brothers, of Red Cloud, Neb. is mentioned in the latest bulletin of "Reported Tests of Holstein-Friesian Cows", published by Malcolm H. Gardner, of Delavan, Wis. She is reported as having made at the age of two years and ten months, a record of 417.1 lbs. of milk and 17.788 lbs. of butter fat, in seven days, equivalent to 22.2 lbs. of butter.

The Champion Holstein for Nebraska in the Senior two-year old for seven day production is Rag Apple Korudyke Boon Dorothy, whose record of 439.6 lbs. of milk and 20.051 lbs. of butter fat, equivalent to 25 lbs. of butter, surpasses all others, according to the records of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America. This record production was made at the B. B. Davis Farm, at Omaha, Neb.

Held Annual Meeting Here

The Golden Rod Highway Association held their annual meeting in the city yesterday and it was well attended by delegates from cities located along this highway system. After all had been banqueted at the Powell Cafe the regular business meeting convened at the Besse Auditorium. Various matters of interest were discussed by those present and among other business transacted a committee was appointed to audit the books of the treasurer, in as much as his report was not submitted at this meeting, and a financial statement will be mailed the representatives in each city along the highway enabling all to have a better idea of what funds are available and how the money has been expended during the last year.

Steps will be taken to incorporate the A-association which will give a more efficient working organization. Many towns complained that no notice of assessment had been received by them the past year. Officers were elected for the ensuing year and plans made for a progressive campaign planned to make the Golden Rod Highway one of the leading routes of the nation. Mr. J. H. Agee, of Superior, was made president, and each city is represented by a Vice-President. Announcement was made that the new log books now being published would be distributed in the immediate future.

Red Cloud Joins Polly League

The Red Cloud Base Ball Team has organized for the coming season and bids fair to have one of the best teams this town has known for some seasons. There will be no hired players but there is sufficient local talent to comprise a winning team.

A league has been formed composed of six teams—Holstein, Upland, Bladon, Blue Hill, Lawrence and Red Cloud. Each team is limited to one salaried player and cannot pay this man more than \$10 for each game. This league is to be called The Polly League, and will open May 7th, Red Cloud playing the first game at home with Upland on that date. A detailed schedule for the season will appear later.

Sunday, April 23rd, Red Cloud goes to Riverton for a practice game. As yet there is no game scheduled for April 30th but an effort will be made to have a game here on that date.

The team has received new suits that were ordered by W. G. Hamilton. The suits are white with a navy stripe and will make our players look like a national league assembly.

This is the lineup that will start the season. Some changes may be made later after the team is whipped into shape.
