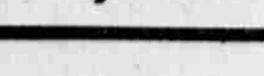

Farm Bureau Notes

GRAMLICK VISITS COUNTY
Professor Gramlick of the University of Nebraska in his visit to the County talked to the High Schools on educational lines and what the University has to offer in the way of higher education. He urged the High School students to decide early in life what they wanted to take up as their future life work and work to that end. He said, while in High School students were learning to apply themselves. He dwelt at some length on Work and Honesty, giving some good examples and stories. Along with the above is cheerfulness and this could best be cultivated in youth.

Professor Gramlick was late one day, due to the storm and missed out on the Hereford Breeders' meeting which was to be held at the home of Frank Bean. The swine breeders held their supper and several Hereford and Short-horn herds were visited enroute to schools.

SWINE BREEDERS' SUPPER

The Duroc and Poland China breeders gave a supper at the Royal Hotel after the fine supper, C. B. Steward acted as toastmaster. J. W. Johnston was called upon to talk on show ring ethics. It has been rumored that Johnston was failing in winning most of the ribbons, especially in showing hogs. His talk was short and his remedy was to raise good individuals and you could win.

Boyd Vance, a director of the Eckley School where more boys and girls club work has been carried on anywhere in the County was called upon to make a few remarks. Mr. Vance said if we wanted our boys and girls to stay on the farm we would have to educate them and interest them in better live stock and better farm conditions.

Mr. McNeny was next called upon to talk on pure bred live stock sales, but owing to the large number of Pig Club boys present he took the opportunity to talk to them. He said his business put him in touch with all classes of people and he said the farmer was the best of all. He urged the boys to stay on the farm and to be a successful farmer one should raise good livestock.

County Agent Fausch introduced the Red Cloud High School Stock Judging team who were guests and talking on promotion work. We often hear that "difference of opinion makes a horse race" and we can just as truly say that it is difference of opinion which makes it possible for us to have several breeds of hogs instead of one. If every farmer thought alike we would have but one breed, but fortunately we do not all think alike. A person's thoughts are often the results of impressions. Every breeder should put forth every effort to impress the public with his favorite breed. First by showing, second by advertising and third by selling. Advertising is part of good selling and good selling is good advertising. The best promotion work is Pig Club and it is very educational to the Pig Club member because he learns feeding, stock judging, breed type, showman and he learns to take defeat as have the pleasure of winning. And to the breeders of purebred hogs honor will be ours only as we see the generations to come and our greatest opportunity to serve the generations to come lies in the pathway of our girls and boys.

Professor Gramlick was the last speaker introduced and his subject was "Breed Type." He said that type had changed of late years and due mostly to the large surplus of fats and a big demand for bacon. He said that the pure bred breeders were breeding the hogs up and the farmer feeder was feeding them down and this condition was working very well. He complimented the Pig Club members on living in an age and county where they could join a Pig Club and learn better methods of raising livestock. He told of the recent feeding contest just closed at the experiment station.

Owing to the lateness of hour Mr. Steward did not call on any other speakers as D. C. Henderson, Dr. Letby and J. W. Auld who were scheduled to give talks.
