FARM BUREAU NOTES

(By H. R. Fauseh, County Agent)

TUBERCULOSIS ERADICATION

A great deal of propaganda is being spread by ignorant persons on tuberculosis eradication work, that is being carried on by the Department of Agriculture and Bureau of Animal Industry. A few facts why vast sums of money is being spent to stop the dreadful plague is that recent medical investigations show that one-third of the tuberculosis in children is of bovine origin.

Dr. Evans, Health Commissioner of Chicago states, that during the year of 1919, 562 children under 5 years old died from bovine tuberculosis.

The only way to stop this plague is by testing the cows. That is why we have laws on our Statute books compelling those selling milk for consumption to test their cows.

HEAVY LOSS TO LIVE STOCK OWNERS

Tuberculosis in live stock has been spreading over the United States infecting countless herds of cattle, hogs and poultry. The annual loss on beef and pork condemned at market centers is now approximately \$40,000,000. This is a loss to both the producers and consumers, but more largely to the producer.

During 1908, 2 per cent of all hogs slaughtered under federal inspection in the United States showed lesions on post mortem. This percentage has increased each year. During the fiscal year of 1921 these records show that 12 1/2 per cent showed lesions.

Approximately 5 per cent of the cattle tested have tuberculosis and 2.6 per cent of all cattle slaughtered under federal inspection have tuberculosis.

Hogs get tuberculosis from infected milk and dead carcasses and not from each other. Poultry get it from hogs. Our main source of infection comes from cattle and we must clean up the disease in them first.

A great deal of space has been used by papers over the state lamenting the fact that certain farmers had their cows tested and an \$80.00 cow had to be shipped on the market and the farmers received \$5 to \$50 for this cow thru salvage and indemnity. How about the innocent babies that have had to drink this milk subject to infection? Can you place a value on the loss of some of these?

INDUCEMENT OFFERED TO GET RID OF TUBERCULOSIS

As an inducement to stamp out this plague, the U. S. Bureau of Animal Industry cooperating with the State Bureau of Animal Industry and the Webster County Farm Bureau have placed Dr. Leiby in Webster county to test the cattle for the farmers free of charge. In case of diseased animals they will pay 2-3 appraised value not to exceed \$50 on a grade or \$100 on a pure bred. If the farmers will refuse this kind of aid, the time may come when they will be compelled to test and get no indemnity.

The most confusion and misunderstanding is caused when an animal that has reacted to the tuberculin test is shipped to the market and passed for meat. This is because the infection was found on the parts of the carcass not used for food. Before spreading propaganda against this work, consult with someone who is an authority on tuberculosis.

WORK ACCOMPLISHED TO DATE IN WEBSTER COUNTY

Dr. Leiby is completing his first first year's work. He has tested 546 herds of 6491 head and 172 reactors have been found. Let us put this in dollars and cents. At a \$1 per head or \$6491.00 and \$7000.00 indemnity and salvage or a total of \$13,491.00. Along with this remember that 516 farm homes are using pure milk.
