### Holstein Cattle 'Make Record

Red Cloud, Nebr., breeders are repeatedly listed in the bulletin of "Reported Tests of Holstein-Friesian Cows" which is published by Malcolm H. Gardner of Delavan, Wis.

In the latest bulletin Starke Brothers have one of their purebred registered Holstein cows credited with producing 721.1 lbs. of butter in 365 days.

This cow, Starke Farms Pieterje Koningin, at the age of two years and five months, made a record of 16169.5 lbs. of milk and 576.88 lbs. of butter fat, in 365 days, equivalent to the above amount of butter.

The State Championship in the Junior two year old class is credited to Varsity Derby Sultana, whose 365 day record is 19555.8 lbs. of milk and 693.50 lbs. of butter fat, equivalent to 866.90 lbs. of butter. This record was made at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, Nebr.
