Red Cloud Defeated Holstein

Sunday afternoon the largest crowd of the season was present at the ball park to see the top notchers, of the Polly league, Holstein, go down to their first defeat by the hands of "Christy's Braves".

As the clock struck three Umpire Elmore stepped out in front of the grand stand and announced "Ladies and Gentlemen the batteries for today are—Roeder, pitcher and Hagemann, catcher for Holstein; Slaby, pitcher and Pichler, catcher for the Braves."

In the first inning the beefy Holsteins came to bat and succeeded in running six runs across home plate on three hits and several errors before our boys settled down and then the visitors were retired in the one, two, three order.

In the second inning Christy's Braves found Roeder and before it was over they ran in four scores, in the third they secured four more. In the fourth inning Roeder was relieved by Christensen, the first baseman, and still the bombardment kept up as the Braves secured two more, in the fifth they secured three and in the seventh, one.

In the seventh the Holstein boys ran in two more and in the eighth it looked like Red Cloud's balloon had blown up as the visitors secured five more scores before they were retired.

Red Cloud won the game by a score of 14 to 13 thus giving the visitors their first taste of defeat.

The following is the summary: Red Cloud secured 23 hits, made 8 errors. Slaby struckout 10 and walked 1, Sutton secured 4 hits out of 5 times up to bat and "Pink" secured a 3 bagger. Holstein secured 17 hits, made 8 errors. Roeder struck out 1, Christensen 6 and walked 3, Essinger hit a home run in the 8th inning.

The Braves have made a good record the past three weeks and if they keep it up no doubt they will secure the pennant. Our team goes to Holstein Sunday and Lawrence comes here the 18th.
