FARM BUREAU NOTES

(By County Agent Henry B. Fausch.) BARBERRY ERADICATION The eradication of the barberry plant has started in Webster county. J. L. Moore of Stapleton and G. V. Jonas of Fairbury representing the Department of Agriculture started work July 1st.

They are making a house to house campaign working out of Red Cloud at the present time. When they arrive at the farm one of the men goes to the occupant and explains their mission while the other makes a survey of the place for barberry bushes. On rainy days when the roads are impassable they will canvass the towns.

The barberry bush was brought in to this section by nursery men selling them for an ornamental shrub not knowing at that time that they harbored rust.

The barberry eradication in Nebraska started in the northeast corner of the state and working west and south. Webster county farmers will be glad to be rid of this pest as it will mean the elimination of one source of rust infection.

Farmers would have cleaned up the plant themselves, but they don't know what it looks like. In their first week's work they have found a number of farms having barberry. It will take about a month to clean up the county.

COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Red Cloud, Neb., July 6, 1922 Mayor Peterson called the Council together to regular adjourned session. Members present, Amack, Crabill, Hummel and Hoffman.

Minutes of June 6, 1922 read and approved.

Report of S. R. Florence read and ordered placed on file.

The mayor made the following appointments of power house employees, which were approved by the Council: W. A. Patten, first engineer, salary \$110.00 per month; C. D. Whitaker, second engineer, salary \$85.00 per month; Bert Perry, third engineer, salary \$75.00 per month.

The proposition for furnishing electric current for the village of Cowles was laid on the table.

The Council instructed the City Clerk to notify the owners of vacant lots to cut the weeds or the weeds will be cut by the city and expense of same certified up to the property as taxes.

The following applications for licenses for hauling freight, etc., in the city limits were granted: G. W. Johnson, Monroe Meinte, J. G. Parsons, Frank Peterson, Platt & Fries, Sam Mountford and Lew Simpson. Erickson and Wolfe were granted license for hauling passengers.

John Sheets' application for a license of hauling passengers was refused.

Councilman Crabill, as chairman of the Finance Committee, presented an estimate of expenses for the year 1922 and moved its adoption, which motion was carried.

The revenues for the city of Red Cloud for the year ending May 1922, were submitted as shown by the City Treasurer's annual report, on file with the City Clerk and the Council instructed the City Clerk to have the estimate published four weeks in the Commercial Advertiser.

On motion the Council instructed the Mayor and Clerk to pay \$2,000 and interest on Electric Light Ordinance No. 61.
