This discovery was made Monday by Bert Anderson of the state land commissioner's office, in making totals on state candidates from the figures on the secretary of state's tabulations. It was announced by the Associated Press that Stebbins had won with several thousand plurality, and Robinson had sent congratulations to Stebbins on that understanding.

In ninety of the ninety-three counties, those not included being Lancaster, Sarpy and Saline, Robinson has 25,418 and Stebbins 24,725. Landcaster county gave Robinson a plurality of 404, so that in the state outside of Saline an Sarpy he has a lead of I,097.-Lincoln Star.
