Hall was chosen as chairman for delegates to the state convention.

THE REPUBLICANS ASSEMBLE IN COUNTY CONVENTION

The republican county convention met at the court house Tuesday. Delegates were in attendance from all parts of the county, included in which were about a dozen ladies.

J. H. Cray of Guide Rock was chosen chairman and G. J. Warren, secretary.

Congressman Andrews was present and gave the convention an interesting address. Senator Rickard of Guide Rock, Dan'l Garber, of this city, nominee for state representative and others gave brief addresses which were well received.

"Resolved, That we heartily endorse the administration of President Harding and the action of congress in their work to restore the nation and the world to a safe and prosperous condition and pledge our best efforts to secure the election of all the republican candidates for office.

"Resolved, That we are not in favor of the Code bill as it exists at present and insist that there be a reduction of the employees about the state house to the lowest number consistent with due efficiency in the management of the interests of the state and that there be no duplication of officers."—Commercial Advertiser.

Exterminate the House Fly. Among the 180 different kinds of bacteria and other organisms taken from the bodies of house flies by different investigators are infantile diarrhoea, typhoid fever, anthrax, food poisoning, amoebic dysentery, abscesses, leprosy, tapeworms, hookworms, bubonic plague, conjunctivitis, summer complaint, tuberculosis, enteritis, trachoma, erysipelas, gas gangrene, stomach worms, pinworms and ophthalmia.
